day, following up the recent publication of the famine conditions in thir-teen districts, the minister of the interior, M. Sipiaguine, issued a long statement on the crop failure and the neasures of famine relief upon which the central government has decided. Acting upon telegraphic reports from the various governors, the government has begun the work vigorously. The sum of 96,000 roubles has been appropriated for the government of Saratoff, 407,000 roubles for Tauris, 100,000 roubles for the non-military peasants in the Don Basin, and 190,000 roubles, with a supply of autumn seed, for the government of Yekaterincelaff. On Aug. 13 the central government's

be increased to 14,000,000 roubles. According to the reports of the governors, state assistance is required in nineteen provinces, not counting the country of the Jon Cossacks, which is ider the war department.



m-here and there an engine lying in the ditch, the bodies of dead horses and mules lying on the veldt, and nere and there the sad sight of little lusters of graves. On reaching Bloemfontein we were

detrained and marched about eight miles to Sydenham, where we encamp-The boys felt the march very eđ. much with their heavy kits after being cramped up on the boat and train. We stopped at Sydenham seven days, and got into fine shape, then marched from there to Spitz Kop, then to Daniels Kriel. Here- "K" Squadron, now become the 21st Troop, dropped out and took up a position at Menzies dropped out Farm. We were then busy enough getting in horses off the veldt, breaking them in, and some of them were true buckers; but the boys stuck to them. It was great fun watching the inexperienced riders on new mounts. Many a header was taken. We also had to fortify the place and get things

in order for a camp which we have now got in fine shape. We have plen-ty of good horses, good saddles, and the men are getting to be excellent riders. About four weeks ago Capt. Pousett joined Major Vaughan's colimn, taking myself and forty tro ers, and we rave since been on the trek chasing Boers. Have located several small parties, but they have always cleared after a shot or two. We are now at Trueters Drift on the Modder River. Our work is to obstruct such drifts as we are not able to hold. There is a drive of Boers expected. along the River this week, which we hope to hold in check while the colins close them in. We have had a

few close shaves. Night before last I sent a party of seven up to a drift. They were fired on; one fellow had his horse shot from under him, and a bullet through the top of his hat. Luckily he was not injured.

There is nothing further I can write this time, except that we are having very little sickness in our troop, an all enjoy the life, which, although

bit rough now, we hope will be better by-and-by. I am, sincerely yours,


