Delegates were present from 1st Sable River, Second Sable River, Rockland, Osborne, Lockeport and Shelburne; and in summing up we find that County churches are in a favorable condition. Locke, after reading of scripture and prayer, reports were heard from Sunday Schools in county. The interesting features of the evening were the addresses given by Rev. J. Murray and Rev. A. H. C. Morse, on Sunday School work. On Wednesday morning a short devotional service, conducted by Deacon James Dunlop was held, then followed B. Y. P. U. session, conducted by Pres. G. T. McDonald. This society is proving itself to be an important branch of church work, the reports were encouraging, and the papers read by Alton K. Dunlop and Alfred C. Hogg, proved grand subjects for thought. At 2.30 p. m. the W. M. A. Society met, in the absence of Pres. Mrs. T. Williams, the meeting was presided over by Sister McKenna of Lockeport. Those societies heard from are doing a good work in aid of missions both at home and abroad, at the close of this session Bro. G. H. Baker, Lic., conducted a short devotional service. In the evening at 7 p. m. the service of song commenced, after which Rev. J. Murray rose to move a resolution, to the effect that this Shelburne Co. Baptist Quarterly Meeting urges that immediate steps be taken to organize this county, so as to secure the largest vote possible in favor of prohibition, it was seconded, and on a rising vote being taken was unanimously supported. Rev. A. H. C. Morse preached the Quarterly ly sermon, taking his text from Matt. 4:17 "Repent for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." The speaker in a very forcible manner reminded us that this Kingdom is not so much a future possession, but that we may enjoy it in our hearts today. The closing session was an evangelistic service conducted by Bro. G. H. Baker, Lic. The next Quarterly Meeting will be held at Forbes Point. Collections amounted to \$6.33.
