## MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSES EXTENDED TO MARCH 31st, 1932

Fredericton, N. B., December, 11.—All motor vehicle licenses, chauffeurs' licenses and operators' licenses expiring on December 31st, 1931, have been extended to March 31st, 1932, according to announcement made today by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works.

The extension of all these licenses, issued by the Department of Public Works, is being made in accordance with the provisions of Section 93 of the Motor Vehicle Act. In previous years all licenses with the exception of chauffeurs' licenses were extended to March 1st, but a change has been made at this time and the extension is for a further period of 30 days for all licenses including the chauffeurs' license.

## Chief Justice Hazen Is Sworn In As Administrator

The Administrator will act in that capacity during the absence from the province of His Honor Lieutenant Governor Hugh H. MacLean, K.C., L.L.D., V.D., who sails today from Saint John on an extended tour of the Old Country.

Mr. Justice O. S. Crockett administered the oath of office to Sir Douglas Hazen Friday morning in the Supreme Court Chamber, the ceremony being attended by Hon. C. D. Richards, Premier of New Brunswick, Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, and others, including Hon. W. P. Jones, K.C., of Woodstock, one time Solicitor General of the province.
