Increase in Cost of Running Municipal Institutions Due to Enhanced Price of Food Products-May Build New Nurses' Home.

The finance committee of the Municipal Council met yesterday afternoon at City Hall and took up the estimates for the county for 1917. It will be seen by the table that some increases are made over last year. The St. John County Hospital asks for about \$2,000, the General Public Hospital for \$4,000 and the Municipal Home for about \$1,000 increase. It was said by the commolibres that these were largely due to the increased price of fool products. The committee will meet again today to discuss the matter of building a new nurses' home, and should this be done it would provide addi-

been supplied to fifteen cases and employment had transportation and over
sixty names had been supplied by the

other organizations so that they might
receive Christmas baskets. The secretary also made reference to a numher of other cases which had been
dealt with the parties in one of these
cases being sent to the Municipal
Home, while others had become self
supporting. The secretary also reported that the association has received a large donation of clothing
for children from the Suffrage Association. Other matters of a business
nature were also transacted at the


