R. Gordon Leavitt submitted his report for the month which contained the following figures: Pupils enrolled 8464, average daily attendance 7632, 42 pupils ill, 11 at work, 49 left the city, transferred, 3 truants, 3 suspended, 17 kept at home.

The report of the auditor, Adam P. McIntyre, made to the Mayor and City Council was read. Mr. Lewis stated that he felt the School Board had no authority to deal with this report as it is made to the Mayor and Council. The bill of the City Auditor for \$174 was enclosed, received, and it was explained that Mr. McIntyre does the work in the evenings and the money is deducted from the funds of the board. Mr. Lewis questioned why the Board should pay the city auditor for an audit made for the benefit of the city. Dr. Bridges said that it was an old arrangement made when Mr. McIntyre became auditor. The matter was left with Trustee Lewis, the Chairman and the Secretary to investigate.

Trustee O'Brien's report for October showed that there are 120 irregular attendants at school, 25 truants of whom 15 have returned to school, 15 have been cautioned, 114 homes and schools have been visited and the officer has been twice to court.
