

WANTS CHATHAM TO INSTALL NEW WATER SYSTEMS

Chlorination Plant is Suggested for Town by Provincial Health Officer.

COUNCIL DECLARES WATER IS GOOD

Clash Between Report of Dominion Analyst and the Provincial Authorities.

Chatham, N. B., March 30.—Dr. Melvin, Provincial Health Inspector, and Dr. Desmond of Newcastle, officer for northern New Brunswick, conferred with the town council here this afternoon regarding the town water supply. Dr. Melvin stated he had been requested by the Minister of Health to come to Chatham as the result of the publication of an article over the signature of the Mayor which claimed that, in view of the report of the Milton Hersey Co., of Montreal, Dominion Analyst, to the effect that the town water was free from any harmful bacteria and in good condition for drinking purposes the council had decided not to purchase the chlorination plant which had been previously authorized.

The aldermen present pointed out that as a result of the finding of the analyst and that no known cases of illness had been traceable to the water supply, the council had considered the purchase of a chlorinating plant unnecessary expenditure and had decided not to install one.

Resents All Blame

Dr. Melvin resented any blame being laid on the county board to Chatham in this connection and the several tests made of the Chatham water sent to St. John to be analyzed he claimed the health authorities had ample grounds for advising council as it had done. He explained that the test made by the town was not the only one necessary or the most important as it might show water in good condition one day and impure the next.

The catchment area test was much more important. He went fully into the matter of proper tests and systems of purification and in closing recommended the removal of some conditions now existing in the vicinity of the source of supply and strongly advised the installation of a chlorination system.

Wants Separate District.

A general discussion followed on health matters in general and it was the consensus of opinion that much more effective work could be done if the town of Chatham was constituted a separate health district.

Before adjourning, Dr. Melvin congratulated Northumberland county Board of Health for the work it had done particularly in the statistical department and paid a tribute to the health officer, H. D. Morris of Chatham.

DEEP WATERWAY TO AID FARMERS OF BOTH LANDS

Commission Told St. Lawrence River Work Will Benefit U. S. and Canada.

INSURE PROSPERITY FOR MANY YEARS

Ex-Senator Files Objections to Plans of the Two Nations.

Detroit, March 30.—Arguments for and against development of the St. Lawrence waterway were submitted here today at the opening of the final hearing of the international joint commission. Representatives of Middle Western States and of Canada made pleas for the waterway while Henry W. Hill, of Buffalo, former New York state senator, urged against it.

Former Senator Hill obtained permission from the commission to file with it a written objection within 11 days after copies of today's proceedings had been given him. He filed with the commission today copies of resolutions adopted by various Eastern organizations opposed to the programme.

Farmers Are Friendly.

C. S. Latchow, secretary of the Farmers and Grain Dealers' Association of Ohio and representing the National Grain Dealers' Association, declared the proposed waterway was essential to the future prosperity of American and Canadian farmers and said the national association had presented included in its membership 5,000 cooperative grain elevators.

B. R. Inman of Indianapolis, representing the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce, declared the waterway would aid in re-populating American farms by providing cheap transportation for farm products.

Prosperity For All.

Former Governor W. L. Harding of Iowa, declared the waterway would insure prosperity for the United States and Canada for years to come.

L. G. Macomber, chief of the Toledo Chamber of Commerce traffic department and U. S. Coney, Congressman from Ohio, also spoke in favor of the project.

A. C. Lewis, secretary of the American Water and Power Association and James H. Duffey, secretary of the National Waterways Association of Canada, both of Toronto, presented a plea for the waterway. They declared a water route from the St. Lawrence to the Atlantic was necessary for the expansion of Canada and declared the possibilities for electric power were unlimited.
