Japan Increasing Navy.

Yokohama, Oct. 6.—It is currently re-ported that the Japancee government with-in the next six years will build four bat-tleships, six first-class cruisers and yar-ious other craft at a cost of \$10,000,000 an-nually for the six years. The battleships are to be built in England and the cruisers in England, France and Germany.
