This appears to leave a month between local and coast payments, the reason is that the trappers fo not get into northern posts until July so it is useless going in June. The local Indians stay home until treaty payments and then come to town to work in the mill, so we pay them early to let them get away to work.

I think \$10.00 for clerical assistance would be sufficient to allow the Medical Officer in any Reserve where the numbers are less than 200, in 1922 he was allowed \$50.00 for Split Lake and Nelson House. Of course the dodtor has not been consulted on this, but I can get the teachers of the schools or the missionaries to act as clerks without any trouble. When we come home I have to do the work of making out the copies of pay-lists in any case, but I require a witness at time of making the payments, that is about all any clerk is on annuity trips and \$10.00 locks pretty good to a school teacher or missionary, and they would appreciate any help of this sort. If the Department thinks this suggestion suitable and it is mentioned in next letter please do not let appear as if I made the suggestion or the medical officer might think I was passing him up on a chance to make money. He can be attending to his medical
