But there was another reason why Mr. Churchill felt the need of being sustained by a vote of confidence on that occasion. Parliamentary responsibility is twofold. Members as well as Ministers have their responsibilities. The people of the United Kingdom had a right to know where their representatives stood, and what support they were prepared to give to the administration in its grave task of carrying on the war. The people equally are entitled to know what support is withheld from the administration, and why it is being withheld.
