TOWNSHIP COUNCILS.

HARWICH COUNCIL

A meeting of Harwich council was held on Monday, May 8th, 1905, at township hall. Members all present. Minutes of April 10th read and adopted.

Following communications were received: Addison Smith, asking aid; Min. World, Dr. R. C. Young and Nat. Sanitarium association acknowledging receipt of remittance; Kent Childrens Aid society, also a deputation asking for a grant to said society; G. T. railway re not having received assessment notice for 1905; Bell & McCubbin re drainage matters.

A petition was received from ratepayers on Pearson drain in Harwich, asking that work on said drain had not been completed in accordance with the engineer's profile and specifications. On motion the clerk was requested to refer the council of Blenheim re said drainage, and asking them to have said work made to conform to said specifications and profile.

The clerk reported having made declaration as to costs in appeal on Morrison and Cameron drains, and notified the appellants of the amount, with demand for payment of same.

O. Buchanan reported the work on Howard drain as now completed and recommended the payment of the balance, \$30, to R. Morris, the tractor. Report adopted and ordered paid.

R. M. Thompson, solicitor for D. Walker, requested the council to take action to have the Tap drain across W. Knott, to the Cameron drain, repaired, so that his clients could take advantage of the drainage, claiming that the municipality in taking over the Gravel road from the company assumed all the liabilities for the repair of said tap drains. Referred to the clerk to look up and report.

J. McCormick reported re Glenn grievance. His fence has been broken in 7 places and damages sustained otherwise, and Mr. Glenn accepted an offer of settlement of \$11. Referred to the clerk to look up and report.

A petition was filed by Chas. McKenzie and others asking for a grant to grade and gravel the road leading to the cement works at Shrewsbury. A committee, consisting of the council, was appointed to investigate the same, also to investigate the infringement of the R. M. railway on Township road at Erieau.

On complaint of J. Jacques re opening under the R. M. railway for outcrop of gravel, not being low enough to permit of the water getting away freely from the south side of said railway, the council instructed the clerk to write the company re the same.

Following change was made in the assessment: L. E. Bidley, Wm. Mead and Jas. Liddie, place at C. Hugh, Neil McMillan and S. Spobel. On motion of Clerk Campbell, certain of the unpaid taxes on the collector's roll were struck off and credited to the collector.

Moved by Campbell-Bentley that whereas notice was given by the clerk, in accordance with resolution of April 10th, 1905, to all ratepayers in school sections Nos. 1 and 2, that application had been made to have lots 4 and 5, con. 5, R. T. transferred from school section No. 1 to S. S. No. 2, and also that a by-law for said transfer would be submitted on May 8th, 1905, at 2 p. m.; and Whereas no persons appearing at said council at their meeting on said date protesting against said transfer.

Therefore this council hereby pass said by-law for the transfer of lands from S. S. No. 1 to S. S. No. 2 was given its various readings and finally passed and duly signed by the clerk and clerk, and sealed taking effect from and after Dec. 25th, 1905.

A by-law amending by-law No. 800 and 809, of the Township of Harwich, in accordance with amendments made by statute, 1904, the amendments being as follows: By-law No. 800 amended by striking out Sec. 3, subsections 1 and 2; by-law No. 809 by inserting between the words "same" at the end of the fifth line and the word "not" at the beginning of the sixth line the words "on said land, and on the highway adjoining said land."

re out at R. P. drain at Drake road. I would say the job was sold to the lowest bidder, in the presence of seven ratepayers for \$137; I favored no body's bid neither this nor any other job I sold during the entire year.

Mr. Nicholson appeared and asked the council to have the fence placed across the 17th con. road by Mr. Gill, removed to give him access to the back of his place. Mr. Nicholson also wanted the Lancaster ditch deepened. Action on the proposed under the R. P. drain.

Joseph Robbins and James Clements appeared and asked for some assistance. No action. Mr. Wm. Geo. Thomas complained that the Freeman ditch was not deep enough along the 14th con. road and in the water level. A by-law was passed appointing C. Bogart, of Merlin, as Sanitary inspector.

REPORTS.
From W. G. McGeorge, O. L. S., for the improvement of the Pike Drainage works, at an estimated cost of \$13,000. Library board assessed \$1319.49 for the town line.
W. J. Shreve, that he had investigated the grievances of the Freeman Run re Doyle drain and found that drain needed repairing north of the 5th con. road.

S. F. White, that the bridge over the Gov. drain No. 2, was fully completed. Com. fees \$25.
The treasurer reported that he had returned the roll with \$1192 not collected.

In reference to the bridge over the Shad drain asked for by Henry Parsons, the clerk submitted an agreement signed by Alex. Parsons relieving the township from all responsibility until the drain is repaired again.

Sykes—Irvine that the matter of the fence in the gravel pit at Cedar Springs be referred to the roads and power—Carried.

Sykes—Wellwood that the grievance of J. Moorehouse re bridge over the Stewart drain be referred to the commissioner of No. 2, with power to the roads and power.

Wm. Pratt, Jno. Robbins and R. Pepper to commute their statute labor for a term of years be received an referred to Jas. Wellwood to superintend and report on not later than Sept. 1st.

Wellwood—Sykes that the court revised the assessment roll for 1905, be held in the town hall on the 29th day of May, at 1:30 p. m. the clerk advertise the same accordingly.—Carried.

Council adjourned to May 29th.
