I think that the Infirmary will be nice and comfortable home for the sick boys.

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The general health of the boys in the Home during the year has been good, as will be shown by the Medical Officer's report; but, unfortunately, the skin disease referred to last year as having caused very much trouble and expense, still causes isolation of some nineteen boys from the rest of the household; and the Committee are glad to report that the Infirmary, which will be known as "The Dunlop Infirmary," has been completed, and the sick of the Home have been removed from the temporary premises to it, where they hope to be able to give them much more comfort than they could under the former system.
