COOKVILLE PRISONERS ARE WITHOUT FUNDS FOR DEFENCE

Deny Connection With Infant's Death—Mrs. Nesbitt Has a Husband Out West

SACKVILLE, June 10.—William Boyles and Mrs. Annie Nesbitt were brought from Cookville this morning by Constable George Lawrence and appeared before Police Magistrate Jordan for examination. They were not asked to plead, however, and were remanded until next Monday. Raleigh-Trites appeared for the crown, while neither prisoner had counsel. Boyles and his fellow prisoner were taken to Dorchester at noon and will be brought back here on Monday. Both prisoners were interviewed in the lock up by your correspondent. Boyles was cool and unconcerned, but the Nesbitt woman seemed decidedly nervous. The former stated that his home was in Prince Edward Island, twenty-eight miles from Sackville. He has been living in Cookville for seven years. It is said that he married Mrs. Boyles

as the result of a matrimonial advertisement published by her. He is a big man, rather rough of feature, and manner. At present his nose is bandaged; the result, it is said, of a fight with William Tolley, the man who found the body of the child. There had not been the best of feelings between the men for some time. Mrs. Nesbitt is a slight, rather faded woman of thirty-five or forty, with a worn face and no specially attractive features. She has been twice married; her first husband, one Milton, having been drowned, and the second, she says, being a checker or stevedore on the steamer boats at Digby, Minn. She left him a year ago last fall. She is anxious to secure a lawyer, but lacks funds. The same is true of Boyles, but it is expected that relatives will aid Mrs. Nesbitt at least in this respect.

DEATH OF A WELL KNOWN CLERGYMAN

Rev. David W. Pickett Passed Away at Oak Point—Was of Loyalist Descent

The death occurred at an early hour this morning at Oak Point, near Greenwood, Kings County, of the Rev. David Westmore Pickett, who had been in the city for many years. He was a well known clergyman in the province. He was born at Kingston, Kings Co., and attended the grammar school at Kingston. At fourteen he went to Kings College, Windsor, and obtained his B. A. in 1857. Just ten years later, the degree of M. A. was conferred upon him; and in 1867, or just fifty years later, the honorary degree of D. D. was received by him from the same institution. After leaving college he taught the grammar school at Kingston and later the collegiate school at Windsor. He was the pastor of the Methodist church of Greenwood, where he spent the remainder of his days and where he was well known by all the residents of the river parish.

GOLDEN WEDDING AT ANNAPOLIS

Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Gates Celebrate 50th Anniversary Surrounded by Many Descendants

ANNAPOLIS, N. S., June 10.—Surrounded by their children and grandchildren and many of their friends and relatives from the United States, the Rev. and Mrs. Edwin Gates celebrated their golden anniversary at Annapolis, N. S., on June 9th, 1859, that Mr. and Mrs. Gates, who before their marriage was Miss Horatia Ryerson, daughter of the late George Ryerson, of Clarendon, were united in the holy bonds of matrimony by the late Rev. William Godfrey, rector of Clements. The only surviving witnesses of that event are Mrs. Starrat, sister of Mrs. Gates and Miss Godfrey, both of this town. All the children of this happy couple with one exception are home for the event and are: Mrs. Hanfield Whitman, of Halifax, and Mrs. Kent and Mrs. Thompson, both of Boston. Mrs. Colby G.
