Advance has Begun in East Africa

London, August 9—The beginning of a forward movement in the Lindi area of the Indian Ocean, in South-Eastern German East Africa, is described in an official statement issued tonight. The offensive began August 2nd, when the Germans were driven from their advanced positions on the Hihubia stream, 10 miles southeast of Lindi. On August 3rd the enemy's main positions were assaulted in a frontal attack by African troops, who made some progress but the turning movements intended to envelope the German right flank, encountered strongly posted defenses concealed in dense bush. Severe fighting ensued, the enemy vigorously counter-attacking, and the British, Indian and African forces fighting with great gallantry.

The action was indecisive, the losses on both sides being considerable. The British forces are entrenched on the ground gained, the statement says, and the advance will be resumed shortly.

Greece is at War With Teutons

London, Aug. 1—In reply to a question in the House of Commons today Foreign Secretary Balfour said Greece was now definitely at war with Germany, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria.

In a statement at the time of the assembling of the Greek Parliament last month Premier Venizelos said Greece was in the war with the Entente. No formal declaration to this effect was considered necessary, the Venizelos Government established at Saloniki before the deposition of King Constantine having declared war and placed troops in the field.

Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Will Have to Depend On the Local and Western Markets for This Season's Crop

London, Aug. 14—In the British House of Commons, the secretary of admiralty held out no hope for the removal of the ban on the importation of Canadian apples. It had been urged as an argument for the lifting of the embargo that there are ships that leave Canadian ports with part of their cargo space unused, but McCallum Scott, who raised the point recently, was informed that at the present time this space could always be used for cargo of considerably greater importance than apples.

In reply to his question on the matter Shirley Benn was informed that adequate means have been taken to ensure that ships being built in Canada would be so constructed as to be suitable not only for trade of the present moment, but also for post-bellum requirements.

Two Machines Destroyed

London, Aug. 13—Two of the German machines which yesterday evening raided the English southeast coast watering places were destroyed by British naval airplanes. The official statement issued by the Government today says that one of the machines was a Gatha airplane and the other a seaplane.

"German airplanes and a captive balloon were brought down yesterday by our pilots. Three other enemy machines were forced to land, having been severely damaged."

An officer home from the front was telling one of the London papers last week the story the London papers last week that at one of the great base hospitals in France a little old lady makes it her daily business to attend the funeral and place a wreath on the grave of every soldier who succumbs to his wounds. Her age may be anything from seventy to eighty, but she performs this self-imposed duty, summer and winter, in all weathers. She is only a woman of the prosperous peasant class, and her rusty black dress and old fashioned bonnet conform well enough with her worn, wrinkled face and white hair. Every morning she presents herself at the hospital and follows the mournful little processions to the cemetery. She cannot afford a wreath for every soldier, so the fresh one she brings every morning she lays first on one grave and then on another as the men are buried. "I do it because it would please the poor English mothers if they knew," she says.
