Nova Scotia Temperance Act.

Two cases have been heard in Kentville under the N. S. Temperance Act and convictions were obtained in both. The first was an action taken against Wm. Webster for procuring a bottle for a soldier. He was convicted and fined \$100.00 and costs.

The second case was against Walter Moore and was obtained on the evidence of several Windsor lads who came to Kentville in September and on their return one or more was placed in jail for drunkenness. They told at Windsor that the liquor was obtained in the stables of the defendant at Kentville and from this statement evidence was obtained that liquor was obtained from some unknown person in Moore's stables, witness did not know whether it was an employee or not. Stipendiary Chase gave his decision convicting defendant and imposing a fine of \$100 and costs.

Sergt. Wm. H. Graham, of Windsor, has won the military medal for conspicuous bravery.

Fred DeWolf, aged 32 and J. MacCan, aged 49 are two Windsor, Citizens who have recently died.

## OBITUARY

Mr. L. F. McCoy

It is with regret that we are called upon to give a more extended notice of the death of one of Kentville's most progressive citizens, Mr. L. F. McCoy Manager of Supplies Limited died at his residence on Thursday last at the age of 34 years.

Mr. McCoy made a brave fight for life some years ago taking a course of treatment at the Sanatorium. While his health never fully recovered he was most energetic in the work which he performed.

His death was caused by a heavy cold which developed into influenza and pneumonia complications. He was ill two weeks and leaves a wife, formerly Miss Constance Lockhart and two children. He was a son of William McCoy of Moncton and had resided in Kentville for the last ten years. He had the distinction of being the only wholesaler in this section of the country to employ travelling salesmen. Recently Mr. McCoy added to his enterprises by transforming a warehouse into a factory for the making of sauer kraut and had created out of it a growing industry.

The late Mr. McCoy was a man of wide influence, and had done much to build up the town as a manufacturing and business center. His pleasing personality and sterling business qualities won for him many friends.

The funeral services were held from the home Sunday afternoon with Masonic honors. Rev. R. B. Layton officiated. Burial at the Oaks.

The Red Cross rooms will not be open until further notice.
