The Bank of Toronto are opening branches at Montmarle and Glenarvon.

Captain E. J. Wright has resigned his commission in the 16th Light Horse.

"The Trail Magazine" is a new monthly shortly to be published in Regina with E. A. Sineza as manager.

Sergt. Burrows has resigned from the police force and will act as detective officer for the Saskatchewan Medical association.

The Union Bank is opening a branch at Wainwright, Alta., under the management of G. M. Upham, formerly of Regina and Milestone.

J. E. Bradshaw, M.L.A., for Prince Albert, was in the city yesterday on his way to England, where he will spend a couple of months.

Tees and Perse will build a wholesale warehouse in Regina this spring, having purchased the necessary property from M.Hos. Wilkinson.

Hugh McKellar has resigned as commissioner of the Moose Jaw Board of Trade, to become secretary and manager of their agricultural society.

The Assinboia Club have decided not to sell the club property at present. They have purchased the G. T. Marsh property on Victoria street for \$12,000.

While in Chicago, J. M. Young was interviewed by A. J. Hackett, of Albama, regarding the Regina Street railway. Mr. Hackett is a prominent banker and railroad builder.

Lawford Grant and G. M. Gest, of Montreal, with an expert engineer, were in the city this week. They are interested in securing the franchise for the Regina street railway.

Hon. J. A. Calder has returned to the city from the east where he has been attending the meeting of the conservative commission as the representative of Saskatchewan.

Miss Cora A. Hind, commercial editor of the Manitoba Free Press, is in attendance at the Agricultural Societies convention. The telegram is represented by J. F. Cogswell.

On Monday evening, the staff of the Cockshutt Plow Co. said farewell to D. J. Taylor, the late manager. Mr. and Mrs. Taylor were presented with an address and handsome presents.

Grain is being shipped out over the new Regina-Bulyea line by farmers located between Regina and Bryant, the point ten miles north of the city to which the line is now completed.

H. W. Laird returned from Spokane on Sunday. While there he investigated the Spokane publicity movement and will be able to present a report of great value to the Greater Regina Club.

J. P. Minihniek, formerly manager of the Frost and Wood company's Winnipeg branch, arrived in Regina last week to assume the management of the Cockshutt Plow Co.'s Regina branch, succeeding J. D. Taylor, who is removing to Winnipeg.

The S. O. E. Benevolent Society, Lodge Empress of the West, 177, will hold a concert and dance in the L.O.L. hall, South street, on Monday evening next, January 31st. The Dancers and Maids of England will be the guests of the society for the evening. The hall room has lately been renovated and now presents a cheerful appearance and is a splendid place for the members of the society to spend an evening. A piano has been secured by the society for use at all proceedings. Refreshments will be served at the concert and dance to be held next Monday.

At the annual meeting of the City Football League last week, the following were the officers elected for this year: Patrons, Hon. Walter Scott, Hon. F. W. G. Haultain, and J. F. H. W. Leavitt, a well known rancher, from near Gravelburg, died suddenly from heart disease in the Brunswick hotel shortly after noon Saturday. New Regina Theatre
The new Regina theatre will be opened on Friday, February 4th, and Groves and Moore, the lessees, are negotiating for a suitable play for this unique occasion. The work on the theatre is being rushed and everything will be in complete order when the opening takes place.

Street Railway
Messrs. Gest and Grant of Montreal, and J. E. Sewell of New York were in the city last week and after careful investigation and considerable study, they have decided to submit an offer to the city council to instal a street railway. If their offer is accepted, they will have cars running by next winter.

Windsor Hotel

Williams' New Store
Mayor Williams is going to erect a departmental store that will be in keeping with the Greater Regina movement and which will also be in keeping with a long and successful business career. Over two hundred tons of steel will be used in construction. The new building will have frontage on Hamilton street, Eleventh avenue and a side walk, which will be widened and a side walk placed on it. The size will be 100 by 120, three stories and a basement, and the walls will be built to carry two more stories. This will also leave a space 50 by 120 to add to the building, when necessary.

Melba
Arrangements have been completed with Mr. Shipman, of Toronto, the well known impresario, for the appearance in Regina in September or the first week in October, of Madame Melba, the successor of Patti as queen songstress of the world. In Regina, the famous singer will appear under the auspices of the Greater Regina Club, through the instrumentality of which organization the concert was secured for this city. Some idea of the importance of the event in the musical history of the province may be gathered from the fact that the guarantee for the one concert is no less a sum than \$2,000.

City Chess Club

Poultry Show
Dr. Rothwell and G. A. Gamble appeared before the finance committee of the city council Friday in support of the claim made by the Saskatchewan Poultry association for a grant of \$200. Owing to some trouble over the retention of the show in Regina they were afraid they would not get as large a membership as they had last year. This year they had a balance to their credit of \$53, but this would not go far in the necessary expenses of the show. A building would have to be rented. They expected to rent the Gratton school premises but they would have to undergo some arrangement. A hundred 24-inch coops were needed and these alone would entail an expenditure of \$100. Some of the members of the committee considered the amount asked for too large and after some discussion the application was left over for further consideration.

RAILWAYS CHARTER

Many Old Charters Renewed and New Ones Granted. The Edmonton Line Near Disley.

Ottawa, Feb. 1.—The railway committee of the house of commons partly disposed of Dr. Cash's authorize the construction of Canadian Northern lines in the west to renew a number of existing lines. The committee agreed construction of the following lines:

From a point at or near thence in a generally north-easterly direction to a point in Winnipeg river, in or near township 8, range 10, east of the principal meridian.

From a point on the company of railway at or near Prairie, thence in a generally easterly and easterly directed to on the Ridgeville section of of railway, in or near township 7, west of the second range from a point at or near thence in a generally south-easterly direction, keeping Moose Creek and the Spuris a point in or near township easterly to a point at or near a fault, with a branch from a such line or location at or near a point at or near Percec in township 1, range of the second meridian.

From a point on the Lake and Saskatchewan between Davidson and Disley, a generally westerly and north-easterly to a point on the Calgary line, in or near township 4, west of the principal meridian.

From a point on the line or near Lashburn, in township 25, west of the third range in a generally north-westerly direction to its authorized line between and Camrose, in or near township 22, west of the fourth range from a point on the Calgary line at or near the Red Deer river, in or near township 28, range 19, west of meridian, thence in a north-westerly and westerly passing through or near Rocky Mountain House, waters of the Bassinau rivers, and thence to an authorized line at or near lowland Pass.

From a point on its line near Winnipegosis, generally southerly and westward, to a point on its line near the south end of town.

From a point on its line between Prince Albert and 3, west of the principal meridian, in a generally north-easterly direction or near the Great Slave river, east of Lake Itan, westerly via the Narrows on its constructed line to View and Robin.
