are for Leeds county :-J. R. Dargavel, M.P.P., Egin-Hay is not over half a crop, but well saved. Barley is about 75 per cent of an average crop. Oat straw is very short, but there are no serious complaints of rust or insects. Corn is backward, but with favorable weather it will come on all right. There is an increase in the acreage of roots and these are looking well. Grain crops, generally will not give over 75 per cent of the returns obtained last

E. C. Bulford, Athens-Up to the 10th of June, says Mr. Bulford, it was cold and wet in this section, and since then we have had the most discouraging drought since '88.
