**HERE'S A CHALLENGE**

Chatham Footballers Want to Play Glencoe on Neutral Ground.

The following challenge appears in today's Toronto Globe:

Sporting Editor Globe:—Sir, In reference to the recent deciding association football match of the eastern series of the Peninsular League, between the Chatham and Glencoe Clubs, played at the game of the Glencoe team, Mr. C. Stuart, of Windsor, was the appointed referee, but he could not attend, and sent Mr. E. H. Kidd, of Detroit, in his place. Mr. Kidd acted until Chatham scored the first goal, when he was replaced by Dr. Dewar, of Glencoe, on a telephoned message from the league secretary. The statement declares that the referee's decisions were partial and unfair and that his decisions were not in accord with the facts.—Sporting Editor Globe.

Now, in view of these circumstances and the fact that we conscientiously believe that we possess the winning team on a fair field and no favor, we desire to challenge Glencoe to play an exhibition or league game, at their own choice, on Bennett Park, Detroit, or the London or Toronto grounds, immediately upon the receipt of the challenge, and to have the game refereed by a competent referee, who shall be chosen by the residents of the respective towns. The game to be refereed by Dr. Forsyth, Berlin; Wm. McDonald, Detroit; J. C. Stuart, Windsor; C. H. Good, Toronto; or J. W. Cousie, London.

The Chatham club as an organization cannot jeopardize their amateur standing by making a more liberal offer than that of expenses, but we are authorized by four of our citizens to state their willingness and desire to place \$150 or more at the disposal of the Glencoe enthusiasts who have expressed their desire to speculate upon their team. This money will be deposited with the sporting editor of the Globe or Mail and Bankers immediately upon Glencoe's acceptance of this challenge. Sincerely yours, R. G. New York, Nov. 28.—A plot to assassinate President McKinley has been made known to the police of Hoboken, N. J., says the Evening World. They have communicated with the secret service bureau at Washington, furnishing the name of the man who is accused. The police received their information through a letter written by a Frenchman, whose knowledge of the English language was exceedingly poor. The name of the accused is withheld by the police for obvious reasons. They have located the writer, and say that his story is at least worthy of investigation.

A card was received from Jas. Houston, drawing the attention of council to the condition of Mrs. Lewis on the centre road, who was ill and in need of assistance. Referred to the reeve with power.

A communication was received from J. C. Bell, M. D., in reference to the order on the treasurer received from the clerk at last meeting, which the reeve refused to sign, and asking that the council authorize the treasurer to pay said order without the signature of the reeve. No action.

The following reports were submitted and on motion adopted and commissioners' fees ordered paid: P. J. Doyle, for repair of culvert on Keek ditch, U. S. Division, at a cost of \$19.60. Com. fees, \$2; Jas. Chinnick, for the R. and H. townline for 1899, \$110.77. Com. fees, \$2; P. J. Doyle, for repair of culvert on Keek ditch, at a cost of \$16.92; Com. fees, \$4. Also the final report of the Dillion Gov. drain, the cost of culvert being \$32.75; commissioner's fees, \$15. N. H. Shepley, re the completion of the township's part of the Doyle ditch No. 1; Com. fees, \$4.

The report of W. G. McGeorge, re the repair of the Burns drain was received and the clerk instructed parties that the report would be read and considered at next meeting.

The commissioner on the Gregory drain reported verbally that he could not sell the work on said drain at the engineer's estimate.

The following persons received pay for sheep killed by dogs: D. Makey, 1 sheep, \$2; T. Brady, 4 sheep, \$13.33; H. Black, 2 sheep, \$6.66; W. Dillion, 2 sheep, \$7.33 and J. D. Houston, one sheep, \$3.33.

Moved by Clayton and Doyle, that the reeve and clerk be and they are hereby instructed to sign the certificate of the order paid for conveyance of McCarthy to the Orillia asylum in 1900.

Moved by Clayton and Irving, that the reeve be the com. to let and superintend the township's part of the Doyle ditch No. 2.

Moved by Irving and Doyle, that the reeve, Mr. Clayton, and the mover be a committee to meet in the clerk's office on Dec. 10th, at 2.30 p. m., to open the tenders for the debentures and disburse of the same.

The by-law is provided for the repair of the Gregory Creek drain was finally passed.

### KRUGER IN PARIS

The Municipal Council There May Advocate Arbitration

Com Paul Pays and Receives a Number of Calls—Won't Visit the States.

Paris, Nov. 28.—Mr. Kruger, at 9 o'clock yesterday, made a call on Premier Waldeck-Rousseau, being accompanied by Dr. Leyds, Dr. Van Hamme and Delegate Fischer. The premier returned the call at 9.30 o'clock. At 10 o'clock the Boer ex-president received the officers of the municipal council and of the general council of the Seine.

Several addresses were presented to Mr. Kruger at the Hotel de Ville, to which he replied in a vigorous speech, repeating his former assertions that the burghers' resistance would continue. On his return to the Hotel de Ville he was given another ovation.

The president of the municipal council, to-day, will propose in the council a vote in favor of arbitrating the Transvaal difficulties.

Henri Rochefort, accompanied by a deputation including Deputies Mille-vins and Paulin-Mery, Senator Pavis de Chaulay and M. L. Coppee, and Lemaire, to-day presented Mr. Kruger with a sword of honor destined for Gen. Cronje, now a prisoner on the island of St. Helena.

Last evening Mr. Kruger and Dr. Leyds drove to the Foreign office, where they were received by the minister of foreign affairs, M. Delcasse, with whom they had an interview lasting three-quarters of an hour.

Dr. Leyds said the statement attributed to Samuel Pearson, former commissioner-general of the Transvaal army, and cabled from New York, that Mr. Kruger would probably soon proceed to the United States, was without foundation. Nothing has yet been decided regarding such a movement.
