London, Mar. 24-A Japanese squadon, Admiral Tsushima commanding left Nagaşaki Saturday for Korea says the Yokohama correspondent of the Daily Mail. "The general opinion here is that the situation is serious Urgent instructions have been issued by the minister of war, Gen. Viscount Katsoura to the commanders of forts to attend a conference in Tokio, to onsider questions of home defense. "The war rumors are causing a fall

in prices on the various bourses. The feeling of the country is uneasy and intensely anti-Russian; but the cabinet shows no indication of its policy. CUSTOMS OFFICER DISMISSED. Yokohama, March 24.-Advices from

Seoul announce that the Korean gov ernment has dismissed from office Mr. McLeavy Brown, director-general of Korean customs, and that Great Britain is protesting against his dismissal.

RUSSIAN VICTORY. London, March 24 .- The dismissal of Mr. McLeavy Brown from the post of director of Korean customs is regarded in London as another score for Russia. In 1895 and again in 1898 Russia pressure was exerted to produce his re-moval. In the latter case he was only

reinstated after a British squadron

reinstated after a British squadron had moved to Chemulpo.

As recently as a few months ago. Russia strongly opposed an attempt by Mr., Brown to raise a loan for the Korean government to purchase shares in the railway from Scoul to Eu. San. As a result of her apposit Fu-San. As a result of her opposi-tion the negotiation for the loan failed. The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail asserts that M. Pavloff, Russian minister at Seoul, has protested against Korea taking foreigners into government service with the exception of Russians and demand-ed the appointment of the latter, but Korea seemed determined with the help of the powers to defend her in-
