TO VALIDATE TITLES.

Licenses to Be Restricted—Local Measures Finally Passed.

Toronto, April 5.—By the bill presented to the Legislature by the Attorney-General, Hon. Mr. Foy, yesterday the purchasers of Cobalt and Kerr lakes are to be protected from litigation from parties alleging prior discoveries or claims.

In presenting the measure Mr. Foy explained that last year orders in Council were passed withdrawing these lakes from exploration and the present bill enacts that persons alleging prior claims may be dealt with only by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council.

Mr. Cameron (West Huron) and Hon. Mr. MacKay took exception to the principle of the bill. They charged that the bill was an interference with the legal claims of the Florence Mining Co.

Hon. Mr. Whitney said the alleged discovery was subsequent to the withdrawal of the lakes from prospecting operations by order in Council.

Hon. Mr. MacKay said it was a matter of principle. Either the Government sold a good title or a bad one.

Hon. Mr. Foy declared the honor of the Province demanded the protection of the bona fide purchasers.

The Attorney-General also introduced a bill to amend the Ontario election act—a measure technical in character.

Respecting St. George's cemetery in the township of Bentinck, Grey county—Mr. Jamieson.

To Limit Sale of Liquor.

Mr. Thompson (Wentworth) moved the second reading of his bill to amend the Liquor License Act, by prohibiting any agent or disposing of any liquor outside of the municipality in which he has his license.

Hon. Mr. Hanna said the bill was merely a discrimination in favor of the wholesaler, which he was sure was not the intention of the mover. He asked a withdrawal of the bill.

Hamilton had established a so-called agency at Dundas in competition with a retailer who paid his regular license.

Mr. Hanna replied that the case in question was now under the department's consideration.
