Toronto, April 5.—By the bill presented to the Legislature by the Attorney-General, Hon. Mr. Foy, yesterday the purchasers of Cobalt and Kerr lakes are to be protected from litigation from parties alleging prior discoveries or claims.

In presenting the measure Mr. Boy explained that last year orders in Council were passed withdrawing these lakes from exploration and the present bill enacts that persons alleging prior claims may be dealt with only by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council.
