



CONTRACT WITH A RAINMAKER.

Text of Agreement Made by Yukon Council With Hatfield.

The contract that has been made in the Yukon with Charles M. Hatfield, the California rainmaker, to increase the rainfall in the gold fields this summer, is in the following terms:

California rainmaker, to increase the rainfall in the gold fields this summer, is in the following terms:

"And whereas, Mr. Hatfield has undertaken and agreed to increase the rainfall in such part or parts of the Yukon Territory as may be indicated to him by the board hereinafter provided for, to an amount sufficient to ensure, as far as rainfall will, a successful and prosperous summer for the placer mining industry of the Dawson district, to the satisfaction of the said board, on the following terms, that is to say: That he be furnished free of charge transportation for himself and one assistant, and for said appliances from Los Angeles, Cal., to the part or parts of the Yukon Territory so selected, and from here back to Los Angeles, and living expenses for himself and said assistant during their stay in the Yukon Territory for the purpose of so increasing the rainfall. That if successful in preducing such increase of rainfall in the Yukon Territory in such part or parts thereof as aforesaid, and renewing such increase from time to time for a pecidod not exceeding four months, as may be named by the said board, that he be paid in lawful money of the Deminion of Canada the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars less the cost of such transportation and living expenses.

"And whereas it is expected that the

thousand (\$10,000) dollars less the cost of such transportation and living expenses.

"And whereas it is expected that the Commissioner-in-Council of the Yukon Territory will vote the sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars to be paid to the said party of the first part, if successful, to the satisfaction of the said board or a majority thereof, in increasing the said rainfall;

"And whereas the said sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars is to be collected by subscription, for the purpose of paying or of providing for the payment of the balance of the said sum of ten thousand dollars."

In consideration of one dollar the parties to the contract agreed to ablde by the provisions. The board referred to might be selected as follows: Three by the Commissioner of the Yukon Territory; three by the party of the first part; and one umpire to be selected by the six selected as aforesaid, and by the Commissioner of the Yukon Territory if said six within five days after appointment of the last of said six fail to select one as an umpire. The said six within five days after to select one as an umpire. The board's decision was to be considered as final, and if, in its opinion, Hatseld did not succeed in increasing the rainfall he promised, he was to get no pay.

Trustee Simpson of Toronte Tells Why Socialists Object To It.

Mr. James Simpson, a prominent So-Mr. James Simpson, a prominent So-cialist and a member of the Toronto Board of Bducation, freely expressed his opinion on Sir Frederick Borden's recent speech, in which he advocated teaching school children how to handle

the rife.

"The Socialist has no objection to the development of marksmanship or physical development," said Mr. Simpson. "What the Socialist objects to is the development of the military spirit amongst the Public school pupils which of necessity involves national animosist lies and prejudices. If Sir Frederick Borden seeks to make the Public schools a kindergarten for the registrate of Canada, Socialists will oppose it to the bitter end. The development of the military spirit in the Public schools is of necessity involved in a method of military training advocated and endorsed by military men.

"The general assumption is that peace is best preserved when nations are armed to the teeth, but the careful student of economic conditions realizes from the nations are being utilized to persecutate the sovereignty of a ruling plutoracy. In the great conflicts between the capitalist class and the working class, as instanced in Toronto, Winning and the State of Colorado, the military powers are ostensibly used to preserve law and order, but are actually suitlised to maintain conflictions against which the working class are fighting. "The burdens of militarism are to-day withing down the wage-earners in all the so-called civilized nations of the so-called civilized the rifle.
"The Socialist has no objection to the

weighing down the wage-earners in all the so-called civilized nations of the world, and there is an ever-growing conviction that these burdens much the solutions of the world. world, and there is an ever-growing conviction that these burdens must be removed. The military forces of Germany would to-day be utilized to limit the franchise rights of the working class of that country were it not for the strength and virility of the Socialist party, and events of recent years in Hungary and Russia demonstrate beyond doubt that the Socialists are the only political organization to which the oppressed classes can look for their emancipation.

"These being the facts of history, ne sophistry or appeals of the jingo can influence the Socialist to change his attitude towards the growing spirit of militarism in Canada, and there neved was a time in the history of our country when the voice of the working class was so much needed to attract the attention of the people to the evils resultant upon the adoption of the policy so strongly promoted by the Minister of
