Maritime W. C. T. U. Convention. The following is a condensed account of the recent convention at Yarmouth as presented in the report of the delegates which was read at the last regular meeting of the W. C. T. U. in this town.

The thirteenth convention of the Maritime W. C. T. U. convened at Yarmouth on Sept. 19th. The first meeting was held on Friday evening in Boston Marine Hall, which was crowded to its utmost capacity. It was a meeting of welcome to the delegates, and has already been reported in a previous issue of the ACADIAN. The business sessions opened on Friday morning at half-past nine. Mrs Rose, Vice-Pres. for N. S., presided in the absence of the President, Mrs Archibald who is now in England. There were present five officers, seven superintendents and forty-seven delegates.

After devotional exercises, a greeting by cablegram was read from Mrs Archibald, and another by letter from Mrs Turnbull—Vice-Pres. for N. B., who is now in California. The treasurer's report was read showing the receipts of the year as \$959.00, and leaving a balance on hand of \$363.18.

The session closed with a bible reading by Miss Hooper of Fredericton. In the afternoon the report of the corresponding secretary was presented, which occupied an hour in the reading, and gave much information, in detail, as to the work being done by the local unions in the Maritime Provinces. In accordance with a notice given last year, the following resolution was moved by Mrs Whitton, of Halifax, and seconded by Mrs Atkinson, of Moncton; "Believing that the best interests of our constantly increasing work would be better served by the dissolution of the Maritime W. C. T. U. and the establishment of provincial unions in N. S., N. B., and P. E. I., Resolved, That we do at this time take immediate action to bring about a separation, and that full time be allowed for discussion on this important question. After an earnest discussion of some length, on division the resolution was lost 27 to 23. At the close of the session the delegates were taken by the people in the town on a most delightful drive through Yarmouth and its suburbs. The public meeting of Friday evening has already been noticed in a previous number of this journal.

Saturday morning was devoted to the hearing of reports from superintendents of departments, after which a notice was given of motion to reconsider the question of the dissolution of the Maritime Convention.

At the following session this resolution called forth a most spirited discussion, but it was voted down. Election of officers for the ensuing year was now in order, but after several ballots for president, no one was found willing to accept such arduous duties as this position involved, and a motion was made that in view of the peculiar situation the question of dissolution be again discussed.

This motion was carried. It was then voted that the Maritime union be dissolved, and organizations of provincial unions be established, for a test period of three years. The meeting was then addressed by Miss Hooper, a missionary who had spent twelve years in India. She spoke of "Child Widows of India," and eloquently portrayed scenes that had come under her own eyes, and moved the hearts of her hearers in behalf of their sisters in India. Miss Hooper is interested in raising an endowment fund for establishing in India a home for Hindu widows. She said, "I am sure the Lord will give me the \$10,000 I have asked for. It is a work an angel might covet to rescue one Hindu widow—of whom there are 25,000 in India." A contribution of \$10.00 was taken on behalf of Miss Hooper's work.

On Saturday evening a public meeting was held under the auspices of the Young Women's Christian Temperance Union of Yarmouth. A large Y of form, among other floral decorations and lanterns. At this meeting Mrs MacDonald of Halifax, read a paper for girls, urging upon them more earnest thinking, broader views of life, and greater care in the use of language.

This was followed by a parliamentary drill. At the close of the meeting each delegate was presented with a souvenir from the Y. This was a photograph of different points of interest in the landscape of Yarmouth and its vicinity.
