Keep the Eyes Clear. The eyes have a very important part in making a face good to look upon, or the opposite. While nothing can safely be done to alter the shape or color, a most attractive clearness will be the result of proper attention to hygiene, exercise in the fresh air, and of a healthful tone of mind.

For it must be remembered that the eyes are "windows," through which the spirit looks out.

Abuse of the eyes in childhood is responsible for many unattractive and diseased eyes. It is well to remember at all ages that, when reading, the light should always be steady—not the flickering flame of a candle—and from the side.

This last point is important, and much better than having the light at the back. A great mistake is to have an unslated lamp on the table by which to read, and a still greater mistake is to keep on using the eyes after they are tired.

Bathing weak eyes in boracic water at night is good; but never should be beguiled into using lotions or drugs that are manufactured for the purpose of making the eyes seem bright through dilation of the pupil.

Massage by circular movements at the side of the eyes, and as the beauty of any eye is spoiled by puffiness, place the fingers against the nose, and draw them lightly toward the temples, passing under and above—but not over—the puffy places. As to clipping the eyelashes, in some cases the growth will be encouraged in this way, but in all cases the delicate point of the lash, which, in itself so small, is so effective, is sacrificed, and, moreover, the clipping must not be attempted by any but a specialist in such "beauty" operations.

The eyebrows should be brushed daily, in the shape of an arch, tapering to a point at the end over the outer corner of the eye.

Always sleep in a fairly dark room; no direct light should strike the eyes while sleeping.

Salted Hay. Why is it advisable to salt hay and how much salt to use, are questions to a German authority, as follows:

"Usually salt is only sprinkled on hay or when it has been wet with rain, or is of a pure quality. Nevertheless, it may also be recommended for good hay, even clover and meadow hay.

Leaves of clover and sainfoin hay from salting off through its preventing it from becoming too dry.

"Furthermore, the salting will make it more wholesome and palatable to the animals. For these reasons many farmers also salt their best hay, especially because the keeping quality of the hay is increased. The hay salted with 1 per cent. salt is eaten by cattle and horses with pleasure which is explained by the fact that animals which are fed a ration rich in potash have a natural craving for salt in order to keep their blood provided with the needed chlorion and soda which otherwise are lost by the assimilation of potash.

"And as all grass and hay are relatively rich in potash, it seems natural to add the salt. When the salt is provided in shape of saltstone, they are given a chance to indulge to excess in it, therefore it is better to give it to them by mixing it with the hay according to their requirements, which furthermore is a cheaper way.

If 1 per cent. salt is used, the cattle will get 30 grains of salt for every ten pounds of hay eaten, and that is the quantity required by cattle of average size. This may be increased by half when the food is hard to digest.
