Mason delivered an address on "The Heroic in Home Missions", which was followed by discussion.

FOR PRISON FARM

Representatives of N.S. and N.B. Confer in Moncton on Project.

MONCTON, Feb. 19.—Representatives of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick governments met here this afternoon and discussed the question of establishing a prison farm for the two provinces. Only preliminary details of the question prior to a further conference to be held at a later date were discussed, it was announced after the meeting.

Those present were W. J. O'Hearn, Attorney-General of Nova Scotia, and Dr. Jost, Medical Inspector of Nova Scotia Prisons; Hon. J. C. Rand, Attorney-General of New Brunswick; Hon. Dr. Roberts and W. E. Scully, M.L.A. representing the New Brunswick government.

CANADIANS DEFEAT ENGLISH TEAM BY SCORE OF 4 TO 1

Canucks Won International Title in Tourney With Swiss, Belgians, French and English

PARIS, Feb. 22.—The Canadian University Students hockey team, which is officially recognized at home, defeated the London Lions, including some Canadians, representing England, by a score of four goals to one in the final of the Jean Potin international cup at the Palais De Glace here Saturday night. Teams representing Switzerland, Belgium and France were eliminated in the preliminary contests.

Simard, of University of Montreal, scored the first goal for the Canadians in the first period, and Sexton, of King's College, Halifax, N.S., who was the backbone and captain of his team, equalized for England. Rainville, of the University of Montreal, who was the star of the Canadians, playing brilliant hockey throughout, put his team in the lead early in the second period and Caron, of Laval University, added two more shortly afterwards. The game was a good exhibition of hockey, with the Canadians showing superiority throughout, being in much better condition than the English team.

The teams line up as follows:
Canada—Centre, Rainville, University of Montreal; right wing, Caron, Laval University; left wing, Simard, University of Montreal; right defence, Dufresne, Laval University; left defence, Bonnell, London; goal, Desrosiers, Joliette College; subs., Lawson, North Toronto High School and Pratt, McGill University.
