### GENERAL NEWS.

A French prince advertises that he  
desires to sell his title and arms, which  
are guaranteed by genuine sheepskin  
documents of the reign of Henry IV.

Two men were lately caught sketching  
the engines of the British flag ship  
Blake at Quebec. The sketches were  
destroyed, and now visitors are not al-  
lowed in the engine rooms.

While an agent of the State Bank  
at Durango, Mexico, was conveying  
\$10,000 in gold coin through the Sierra  
Madre mountains, accompanied by 50  
mounted men, the party was attacked  
by brigands and all killed but one, after  
a hard fight.

The mayor of Tiffin, O., has decid-  
ed favorably on a proposition to have  
the police of that city mounted on bicy-  
cles. It is expected that a smaller  
number of men will be able to cover  
a larger territory. Tiffin will be the  
first city to have its police force thus  
equipped.

Steve Clayton and Bill Langley  
recently fought according to London  
prize rules, with bare knuckles, near  
Northampton, England. Forty-two  
rounds were fought, when Langley fell  
from the terrible punishment he received  
and died in the ring. Seven persons,  
including the seconds, have been ar-  
rested and held for manslaughter,  
while Clayton is charged with feloniously  
slaying Langley.

Philadelphia women physicians re-  
ceive large incomes for their services,  
some averaging \$10,000 a year, and  
others receiving \$20,000 annually. Just  
at present there seems to be friction  
among them, and one of the most emi-  
nent women in the profession ad-  
mitted she would never dream of calling  
in a woman doctor to aid her in a diffi-  
cult case, for they would never agree on  
anything.

Near Schuylkill Haven, Pa., the  
other day, was unearthed the well-preserved  
body of a soldier of the Revolution-  
ary Army. The remains were  
dressed in the old Continental uniform,  
wrapped in a blanket and covered with  
successive layers of a peculiar fabric sup-  
posed to be tar cloth. The whole was  
in a remarkable state of preservation,  
due, doubtless, to the location of the  
remains.

The warlike warrior was pro-  
vided with side arms and a flint  
lock musket, and these also were in  
good condition.

A few weeks ago the rumor became  
current in the city of Mexico, that a  
nister in Concepcion convent had dis-  
covered in the archives of that institu-  
tion an old document which stated that  
\$3,000,000 in gold was buried at the  
time of the war with the French, by  
the Lady superior of the convent. The  
location of the treasure was given as a  
base which was forming a part of the  
convent. The work of excavation for  
the money was begun under the direc-  
tion of the priest of the convent. The  
news of the affair reached President  
Diaz, and he immediately ordered the  
priest to suspend operations, and the  
work was placed in charge of the Gov-  
ernment. The treasure was since un-  
earthed, and will be turned into the  
Government treasury.

The tenth annual Convention of the  
Maritime W. C. T. U. opened on Wed-  
nesday morning in the hall of the Wood  
stock W. C. T. U. The hall was taste-  
fully decorated, and the wall bore ap-  
propriate mottoes.

The President, Mrs. W. W. Turnbull  
of St. John, welcomed the members to  
the work of the Convention. The other

Mrs. Williams, President of the Do-  
minion W. C. T. U. being present, was  
warmly welcomed, and invited to a seat  
on the platform. Mrs. Steadman ex-  
President of the Maritime Union, and  
Mrs. J. T. Smith, President of the Local  
Union, were accorded like privi-  
leges.

The minutes of the previous meeting  
were read, and approved. Mrs. Hunt of Boston,  
who was engaged to lecture in the juris-  
diction on scientific temperance instruction,  
Hibernia the Union has observed as  
Crusade Day, Miss Willard's birthday,  
September 28. It was resolved that the  
like honor be done Mrs. Youmans, Jan.  
3rd, so that two Crusade Days will be  
observed this year. One half hour was  
set apart (at noon) for devotional exer-  
cises, during the Convention.

The second session opened at 2.30 p.  
m. with singing and prayer by Mrs.  
Sampson.

The report of the corresponding sec-  
retary, Mrs. T. B. Smith, was read, in  
her absence by Mrs. Steadman. The  
report detailed the work of all the Local  
Unions, submitting reports, ninety-two  
in number. It showed an upward trend  
being made in numerical strength, as well  
as the lines of work pursued. A large  
distribution of literature, embracing  
the thirty-four thousand pages, was  
made. The report was adopted.

Mrs. T. J. Smith presented the greet-  
ings of the Methodist Women's Mission-  
ary Society, which is to meet in St.  
Stephen next week. Mrs. Archibald  
was appointed to convey the thanks of  
the Union to that body.

Mrs. A. Phillips, Superintendent of Sci-  
entific Temperance instruction, read her  
report, showing that each of the provin-  
ces was making advancement. Nova  
Scotia having passed a compulsory law  
on the subject, being taught in her  
schools, while P. E. I. has adopted the  
Pathfinders Series of Textbooks.

A report on industrial schools was  
read, showing that flourishing schools  
were maintained in Yarmouth, Mon-  
cton, Charlottetown, Amherst and St.  
John.

The reports of county superintendents  
being called for, Mrs. Clark reported  
Woodstock Union with 42 members and  
17 lines of work. Benton had 34 mem-  
bers and Hartland 12. Mrs. Tremblay,  
of Colchester County, reports a Union  
of 40 members at Truro and one at  
Grand Village with membership of 25.  
Mrs. Black, of Cumberland, submitted  
the names of Amherst, Parrsboro, Pug-  
wash, Wallace and Springfield Unions,  
with a membership of 76, 40, 20 and 8  
respectively. Pictou County reports  
New Glasgow with 68; Pictou, 48; Steil-  
larton, 27. Mrs. Archibald, of Cape  
Breton, reports four Unions. The  
Union at Cow Bay is engaged in active  
work, and the same is true of Sydney,  
Miss Steadman, for Queen's and Shel-  
burne, reported six Unions, having a  
membership of 73. Mrs. Atkinson of  
Westmorland, reported five Unions.  
Moncton Union numbers 120.

Mrs. M. Burpee read an excellent  
paper on narcotics. Laws have been  
enacted in N. B. and N. S. against sell-  
ing of cigars, cigarettes to boys under  
sixteen. A similar measure failed so  
far as the P. E. I. is legal true.

The closing session was held in the  
Methodist Church. It partook of a  
memorial service for those who had died  
during the year. The choir sang "To  
the work," the president read a passage  
of Scripture and Miss Johnson led in  
prayer. Tender reference was made to  
those that had departed, the influence  
of whose lives will live after them. Mrs.  
W. T. Kerr sang in her usual effective  
manner, "I Heard the Voice of Jesus  
Say," and later, "The Gate of Heaven."

**A Young Man's Chances.**

A mother who now sends out a son  
into the business world, launches him at  
a time when the chances are all in favor  
of a young man, writes Edward W. Bok  
in "At Home with the Editor," in the  
October Ladies Home Journal. Busi-  
ness men were never more willing to  
place large trusts upon the shoulders of  
young men than they are to-day.

"Young blood," as it is called, is the  
life of the modern business world, and  
is everywhere sought. In New York  
the demand for the right kind of young  
men in all capacities is far greater than  
the supply, and what is true of New  
York is true of all the large cities.

Bear in mind, however, I say the right  
kind of young man, and by that classi-  
fication I mean young men who are will-  
ing to work, and work hard. The day  
of the young man who works by the  
clock, eagerly watching for the hour  
when the office shall close, has gone by,  
even if it ever existed. Hundreds of  
young men are energetic in a new posi-  
tion until the novelty wears off and then  
become mere machines whose places can  
be filled at a day's notice.

No mother need have undue anxiety  
for the success of a son who this autumn  
or winter steps out into the business  
world, so long as he bears in mind a few  
essential points.

He must be honest above all things,  
and allow nothing to convince him that  
there is a compromise between honesty  
and dishonesty.

He must be an out and out believer  
in the homely but forcible saying that  
a man cannot drink whisky and be in  
business.

He must, too, decide being a society  
man or a business man; he cannot be  
both.

He must be able to convince him that  
there is a compromise between honesty  
and dishonesty.

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
