N. B. FARMERS
AND DAIRYMEN
MEET IN MARCH

Association will Convene in this
City During Week Commenc-
ing March 18th

YORK AND SUNBURY
POULTRY ASSOCIATION

Also Propose Exhibition Open
to Province to be Held During
Same Date

Mr. W. W. Hubbard, Secre-
tary for Agriculture, today an-
nounced that it was prob-
able that the annual meeting of
the N. B. Farmers and Dairymen's
Association would be held in this city
on the week beginning 18th March
and that with it would be incorpo-
rated a short course in Live Stock
Judging, and also a Provincial Seed
Fair. The York and Sunbury Poul-
try Association were also talking,
said, of holding a poultry show open
to the province at the same time,
and it was possible that there might
be an auction sale of pure bred stock
offered by New Brunswick breeders.
No importation of stock from else-
where was contemplated, but if
breeders within the Province wished
to offer stock of any or all kinds,
the department was willing to pay the
expenses of advertising the sale and
providing an auctioneer. As it is ex-
pected that all agricultural societies
in the province will have delegates
at the meeting, it would be a good
chance for breeders to get in touch
with the societies.

The live stock judging, seed fair
and poultry show and sale would all
be held in the Exhibition Building
which was built last year with this
object in view. The evening meet-
ings of the Farmers' Association
would, however, be held at some hall
in the city, which the City Council
would no doubt, with their usual kind
hospitality, provide.

It was unfortunate, he said, from
the standpoint of the poultry show
that the meeting could not have been
held earlier. It had been, however,
found impossible to get the services
of the various experts for stock and
seed judging or arrange for a stock
sale at an earlier date. Both the Do-
minion Department of Agriculture
and the Nova Scotia Agricultural
College would send men to assist in
the programme and Secretary Bliss
M. Fawcett was now working up a
good programme for the meetings.

THE SCOTT ACT
INSPECTOR MAY
BE DISMISSED

Indications Point to a Change
Being Made by the York
County Council

EX-WARDEN TIMMINS
LIKELY CANDIDATE

Will Probably be Elected to
Succeed W. L. McFarlane
as Inspector

Indications point to a change be-
ing made in the position of Scott Act
Inspector for York County.

For several years, or since Rev. J.
J. Colter held the position, W. L. Mc-
Farlane, of Nashwaakia, has been the
inspector. He was formerly a coun-
cillor for the parish of Douglas and
was also Warden of the county for
one term.

Last year a change was rumored
but did not take place. This year it
is said that the long threatened
change will take place, there being
a pronounced change in the personnel
of the council this year. About the
councillors and elsewhere where the
councillors gather the prospective
change has been much discussed.

Ex-Warden John Timmins is said
to be the likely choice for the inspec-
torship. It is understood that a ma-
jority of the councillors are already
pledged to support him and that his
election is assured. For many years
he has been a representative of the
parish of Queensbury, was formerly
warden of the county and has been
one of the most prominent and in-
fluential members of the past coun-
cils.

The salary which goes with the
position is \$500 per annum and Coun-
cillors' acceptance of the position
will necessitate his resignation as a
councillor.

TO VISIT HOME AFTER
44 YEARS ABSENCE

Mr. Henry McNally, a Former
Resident of Queensbury, Visit-
ing Relatives in the City

LEFT FOR THE WEST
WHEN A YOUNG MAN

And for 40 Years He Never
Saw Any of His Relatives
Nor Visited Home

After having spent over forty
years of his life in Montana, during
which time he never saw any of his
relatives, Mr. Henry McNally, a for-
mer resident of Queensbury, has ar-
rived here to re-visit his former
home.

Mr. McNally was born at Queens-
bury and when twenty-two years of
age, attracted by the lure of the
West, he left here and settled in
Montana, where he became engaged
in mining. Being among those for-
tunate in striking rich claims he
soon acquired a considerable amount
of wealth and finally purchased a
large tract of land near Missoula,
Montana, comprising nearly one thou-
sand acres, and he became exten-
sively engaged in cattle and horse rais-
ing.

For over forty years Mr. McNally
lived in Montana, without seeing any
of his relatives, until about two years
ago, when he was visited by his
brothers, Mr. P. E. McNally and ex-
Warden M. B. McNally.

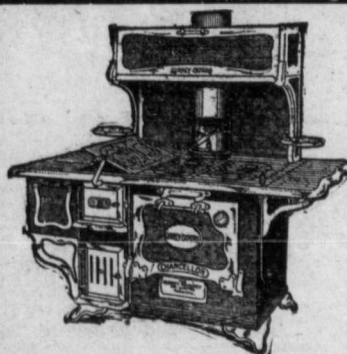
