St. John, May 10.—The court martial which is investgating alleged irregularities in the conduct of the Depot Battalion canteen met again-yesterday in sessions which commenced at ten a. m., and concluded at 5.35 p. m.

Capt. F. W. Campbell, secretary of the newly organized regimental fund board, was the next witness. His evidence concerned the condition of the canteen committee finances as he found them to be, from November last to the present time. From his evidence it was shown that though the accused withdrawn only \$889.83 from the canteen funds, he had made a personal loan of \$7.000 to the canteen committee to meet the pressnig claims of various local merchants, from whom goods had been purchased. The accused seemed to rely upon the other members of the canteen committee for the proper conduct of the canteen.
