**NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAYS.**

A BIG BOOM IN PROGRESS—THE HANTS CENTRAL.

The Sun is informed by Levi Young, of the Bolt and Nut works, who is one of the promoters and has recently returned from a business trip to Nova Scotia, that railway building is booming in that province. The latest scheme, and one that meets with most popular favor, is the Hants Central railway, to run from Truro to Windsor, directly by the valley of the Kennebec river.

This scheme was taken in hand by E. A. Charters of Sussex, N. B. who saw the advantages and necessity for its construction, and having arranged with the directors of the Hants Central Railway Company a definite line of action succeeded in interesting some American brokers and capitalists in Boston among them being Mr. Winthrop, M.B. Howard, a Mr. Mudge, capitalist, and a Mr. Frink, contractor, who have looked into the merits of the proposed route and expressed themselves ready and willing to float the bond of the line and construct the same.

The preliminaries are now about all arranged and the prospects are that the matter will be put into business shape as speedily as possible and the surveys and work of construction commenced.

So favorably are the people of Truro disposed towards the scheme that they unanimously voted the company a cash bonus of \$50,000 in aid of the construction of the same. Mainland and Windsor are both proposing to do likewise, and the municipalities of Hants and Colchester have signified their willingness to provide the free right of way about 50 miles. This route meets with universal favor all through Nova Scotia, as with the construction of the "missing link" and the construction of the line direct line of travel will be had from Cape Breton to Boston by the Hants Central railway, W. & A. railway, Western Counties railway and railway and Yarmouth steamship line.

The only heavy work of any importance is the bridge across the Shubenacadie at Matland, which will probably cost in the vicinity of \$300,000.

**FIRE AT MACADAM JUNCTION.**

About five o'clock Sunday afternoon a fire broke out in the New Brunswick Railway shops at MacAdam and the flames spread with such rapidity that all the offices of the railway employees and the inhabitants were unable to stay their progress until the machine shop, boiler shop, blacksmith shop and pattern shop were destroyed. The fire burned fiercely and by the most heroic work that all the other buildings were saved. The telegraph poles in the immediate vicinity of the fire were destroyed. Ten cars of lumber and freight on a siding were also destroyed. The fire was the result of the explosion of a lamp in the pattern shop, report says. The buildings destroyed were all insured as was also the machinery. Now standing this loss will be a heavy one to the New Brunswick railway.

Advice from MacAdam this afternoon placed the loss much heavier than it was at first stated. A valuable engine in the machine shop was destroyed as were all the tools of the workmen. The total loss is estimated at over \$300,000. The property is insured, but to what extent is not known. It is probably held in the United States.

**JOHNSTOWN, Pa., July 6.**—Cholera morbus in its worst form has made its appearance here. Last night Dr. Foster attended over a hundred cases among workmen. Early this morning Gen. Hastings and Col. Douglas were stricken with the complaint and are confined to their beds. Physicians say the disease has been caused by continued wet weather. Heavy rains flooded out the water, at Johnstown, Penn., last night. There is a great alarm over the condition of the Connequog river which it is feared will sweep over its banks and flood the town.

**NOTES ON PASTURE LAND.**

After a visit to England, there is one thing which I do not think it is sinful to covet, and that is the thick, closely-grown grasses which abound in that country, and upon which their animals are permitted to graze. I do not suppose that we shall ever attain the degree of excellence in Canada which is known there. Our climate and soil are so different that it seems to me impossible to get yet it has often occurred to me that some improvement on what is generally found in this country might be easily obtained. I do not think the system of permanent pasturage would succeed in many districts in this country. We are therefore driven to a system more generally obtained in the north of Scotland where the land is alternately cultivated, and laid down for grass. It may be that precisely the same kinds of grass will not grow in this country, but I think we can succeed so well for them. But if the same preparation of soil, and the same care afterwards were given to this matter, I apprehend we might occupy a much advanced position even here. No grass will
