SACKVILLE SCORCHED

Enterprise Foundry, Intercolonial Hotel and Other Buildings Burned.

SACKVILLE, Thursday.—The lower end of this town was swept by fire early this morning. The flames are still raging but it is believed they are under control. The fire broke out shortly before two o'clock in the Enterprise Foundry and burned it to the ground. It then spread to the stables of the Intercolonial Hotel, which was quickly consumed.

From there it spread to the old I. C. R. depot, which has been used as a freight shed and then back to the Intercolonial Hotel burning both buildings to the ground.

At 3.30 o'clock this morning the flames were continually catching the woodwork of the new I. C. R. depot, which was recently built and destroyed. This building was soon destroyed.

Several dwelling houses in the vicinity have been destroyed. The flames are so hot that trains cannot pass. A special train arrived here about two o'clock from Amherst ten miles away, bearing the Amherst fire brigade and twenty men.

SUSSEX FIREMEN TO ATTEND CHATHAM SPORTS

SUSSEX, Wednesday.—At a meeting of the Sussex firemen it was decided that they attend the Chatham fire sports, which will be held Sept. 15th. Chief Darby intends sending thirty men in all, twenty from the fire department and ten from the salvage corps. The department received an invitation from St. Stephen to attend their sports in September, but have declined, as the St. Stephen sports are not governed by rules of the New Brunswick Fire Association.
