LIBERAL MEETING

Large and Attentive Meeting
in the Rink Monday Night

ELOQUENT ADDRESSES

The Rink which has been rented by both parties for election purposes was well filled on Monday night, there being in the vicinity of fifteen hundred people present, including many ladies. The stage was decorated for the occasion, and flags, bunting and mottoes were arranged in conspicuous places. Above the stage were banners inscribed, "Marcell for Bonaventure", "Laurier for Greater Canada" and "Reid for Restigouche". A large picture of Sir Wilfrid Laurier occupied a prominent position at the back of the stage.

Mr. McLatchy the chairman of the meeting called the audience to order and said he considered it a great honor to open the meeting in honor of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Jas Reid, Charles Marcell and Hon Wm Pugsley, Attorney General of our province. He explained the appropriateness of the mottoes, and called upon Jas. Reid to address the audience.

Mr. Reid made a short, neat and to-the-point speech and in concluding said that he was no orator, that his friends had come to speak for him and that he was pleased to give way to them.

Hon C. E. LaBelle on coming forward said he would take advantage of this occasion to thank the people of Campbellton for the handsome vote they had given him at the last local election. He told of the work which Mr. Reid had done that the people had been looking for for the last twenty-five years. He appealed to the electors to vote for and elect Mr. Reid on Nov 8th.

Hon Wm Pugsley was the next speaker, he took up the question of preferential tariff, fishery question and the G. T. Pacific scheme. He said that it was such men as Mr. Reid who helped Mr. Blair to bring the Intercolonial to its present state of efficiency.

Charles Marcell of Bonaventure followed Mr. Pugsley. He first addressed the gathering in French and elicited much applause from that portion of the audience. In his English address he was equally amusing, and when he had finished many were sorry that he did not speak longer. All agree that Mr. Marcell was the speaker of the evening.

DEDICATION.

Addresses Follow Fine
Supper in Dedication of
Orange Hall.

The handsome new Orange Hall was dedicated last Tuesday evening under very auspicious circumstances. The proceedings began with a tempting supper at five o'clock. The tables were served by the ladies and judging from remarks passed by their patrons, their efforts were very successful and highly appreciated. The tables, which were decorated with flowers, rowan berries and green leaves and vines, glistening with crystal and silver, presented a very delightful and inviting appearance. About 350 persons were served and the menu left nothing to be desired.

At 8 o'clock Grand Master Heine conducted the ceremony of dedicating the Orange Lodge room, which was crowded with members of the order and visitors. At the close of this ceremony a public meeting was held down stairs. Mayor Brown occupied the chair and a good programme of vocal and instrumental music and addresses was carried out. Among the speakers were Grand Master Heine, Grand Treasurer Wadman and Master of Ceremonies J. W. Clark, all of Moncton. There also spoke Rev. O. Steeves, Mr. Donald Morrison, M. P. P. and Mr. Thomas A. Clarke. The latter in course of his remarks said that the members did not wish to hold their grand new hall all to themselves, but wished the citizens of the town to feel that it was theirs. As they had to call on the people for assistance and expected to have to call on them in the future occasionally for financial aid the members desired that the name of the building should be changed and that in the future it be called: "The New-castle Opera House."

Mr. Clark's statement elicited cheers. Miss McLean and Miss Maggie Elliott each sang a solo. Miss Elliott sang a second in response to an encore. A large choir sang a patriotic song during which little Miss Alice Johnston and Master Jule McMurdo advanced to the centre and each held a flag which they crossed and held up during the singing. Miss Olive Williamson presided at the piano and the orchestra rendered some very pleasing selections.

CAMMACK TO HANG.

Jury Disagrees as to the
Son Guilt.

Woodstock, N. B., Oct 29—Thomas Cammack was found guilty of the murder of William Doherty this afternoon by the jury after a short deliberation and Judge Gregory sentenced him to be hanged Jan 12th inst.

In the case of the son, Walter Cammack, the jury failed to agree. On motion of Attorney General Pugsley Walter Cammack was remanded and he was led from the prisoner's box. The Attorney General then asked that the sentence of the court be now pronounced against Thomas Cammack. His honor asked the prisoner to stand and addressing him, concluded as follows:

"The sentence of the court is that you be taken to the place from whence you came and be detained there until the 12th day of January next on which day you will be taken to the place of execution and hanged by the neck until you are dead and may God have mercy on your soul."

Walter Cammack will be released upon giving sureties for \$4,000 a personal surety of \$2,000 and two of \$1,000 each to appear for trial at the next circuit court.
