This expectation, as we then explained, was not founded on any positive promise on the part of the Post Office Department; but was a natural result of Mr. Morris' known anxiety to introduce every practical improvement into the Postal system of this Province. We now find that the popular expectation, in this respect was fully justified. We learn from the best authorities that our efficient and indefatigable Post Master General has, for some months past, been in correspondence with the British post office authorities, with a view to the introduction of the money order system into Canada; and that the more fully to inform himself on a point so much important to the commercial interests of the country, he will despatch the Chief Clerk in his department to England, in the Sarah Strada, for the purpose of obtaining full information of the working of the system in that country.
