There is a strong demand for both the filmy laces, such as Chantilly and "shadow" and the heavier ones such as Renaissance, filet, Venise and various crochets. The novelty of novelties at present is the long redinsote. The graceful, floating ends, reaching nearly to the hem, are trimmed with fur or galloon. This garment is so elegant and requires such costly material to make it effective that it will be difficult for it to become common. Ermine sets are more in demand this season than ever. Coats of this elaborate fur appear in greater number. Collarettes, toques or the handsome scarf and muff are exceedingly popular. Designers have combined ermine with black velvet, making lovely fur-sets which harmonize with any color.
