LONDON, Oct. 16.

With the signature of the Treaty of Peace with Italy, the Turkish fleet is released and becomes no insignificant factor in the Balkan situation. It has still been no declaration of war, but Turkey has recalled her ministers from Greece and the Balkan States, and the allied Kingdoms are expected to declare that hostilities have begun by royal proclamation to-day. News from the theatre of war is still withheld, but correspondents have not yet been allowed to proceed to the front, but the Bulgarian army is believed to be ready to strike at Adrianople, while the Serbian Army is divided into three forces, one of which will march on Uskub in Macedonia by the Morava Valley. After coming in touch with the Bulgarian forces in the neighborhood of Kostenev, the army will advance on Uskub. The second will march through the Egri Palanka pass and Kumanova. The third is expected to unite with Montenegrin forces in the Albanian Alps and the Topaggar district. The main Bulgarian army is massed in the Upper Maritza River, with the object of invading. This force is estimated at a quarter of a million of men.

LONDON, Oct. 16.

Paris and Berlin despatches reflect the anxiety of the Powers lest the Balkan outlook set all Europe ablaze, and end by remaking the map of Europe, and upsetting some crowns. The restoration of peace between Italy and Turkey is not regarded as an unimpaired blessing, inasmuch as Turkey, having now a fleet to keep Greece in order, is under so much less compulsion to accept dictation from the Powers.

Aristocratic Menials

An Archbishop Making Soup For the King.

Many of Britain's leading aristocratic families inherit not only wealth and position, but—what many of them seem to value almost as much—the right to perform various menial services for the reigning King.

For example, the comparatively simple function of washing the royal hands is, on the occasion of a coronation banquet, shared between two gentlemen of high degree. The lord of the manor of Haydon first receives a gilt basin, ewer, and towel from the Officer of the Jewel House. He then pours the water over the King's hands, while the lord of the manor of Workop stands in waiting with a towel.

Most of these hereditary officers are connected with the banquet, at nearly every stage of which some noble or other has a special menial service to perform. This is true even of the earlier stages—the cooking; for no less exalted a personage than the Archbishop of Canterbury himself can be legally called upon to make soup with his own hands for the Sovereign's consumption.

The taking of wine, which in olden days was always accompanied with a certain amount of ceremony, amongst the nobility and gentry, naturally affords a wide field for these honorary services.

Thus it is the task of the Duke of Norfolk, as Hereditary Lord Chief Butler, to see that the wine is properly decanted. He has no fewer than thirteen assistants for this, consisting of the Lord Mayor, and twelve citizens of London, who have also the right to approach the King after the second course, and offer wine in a gold cup. Further, these thirteen assistants have nine sub-assistants in the persons of the Mayor of Oxford and eight burgesses of that city.

The number of persons who have the right to offer wine to the King during a banquet is an interesting reminder of the hard-drinking days. The Duke of Argyll, the Earl of Verulam, and Lord de Ros each have separate duties connected with the pouring out and offering of wine.

The average man is sometimes apt to regard these rights and duties as rather childish, but it must not be forgotten that they are all rooted in some serious purpose. Most of them date from a time when the power of the noble was becoming a menace to the peace and safety of the country. The King would then pick out a particular baron who had recently manifested signs of "uprightness" to the crown, and in presence of a large assembly, confer on him the "privilege" of performing this or that task.

To-day many of these strange duties have been dropped; for example, the present Primate has not as yet been called upon by King George to display his culinary powers. Nor have the Earls of Abingdon and Verulam, with the Marquess of Breadalbane, been observed carving hot joints.

When To Get Married

The question as to the best age for marriage is of perennial interest, and when a statistician of repute and close student of eugenics, like Dr. Frederick L. Hoffman, of New York, speaks his answer to the vital question is worth considering.

"My experience and observation," said Dr. Hoffman, "have convinced me that the best ages for marrying are between 23 and 26 for men and women alike. I have no faith in the theory that there should be a wide disparity between the ages of the man and the woman."

"My reason for fixing on between 23 and 26 as the ideal marrying ages for both sexes are, roughly, these:

"The man and the woman are then so far as marriage is concerned, at their best physical, mental and moral development. On the one hand, the twig has been bent or the temperament has been moulded in the form it will probably retain with a little modification for life.

On the other hand, they are both still sufficiently plastic and malleable to readjust themselves and become mutually complementary to one another. In other words the man is willing to sacrifice himself to the happiness of the woman, and the woman to the happiness of the man. This is one of the essential conditions of true marriage. Perfect co-ordination is another.

"A boy or girl of, say, 18, quite apart from other considerations, cannot be expected to know his or her mind. This point, I think, requires no elaboration. At the same time, I should like to state with all possible emphasis that every man of 25 or thereabouts who is earning his living and wishes to marry should be permitted to do so, provided only that his and his prospective partner are healthy."
