BRITISH SUCCESSES. LONDON, June 20.

An official statement issued by the British War Office to-day, says: On Friday, north of Hooge, we occupied German trenches on a front of 250 yards, which the enemy had been forced to abandon, owing to our local successes there. WASHINGTON, June 20. reported in press despatches vester day, as indicating that Constantinople is in no immediate fear of occupation by the Allies, created a deep impression in the Balkan diplomatic circles here. In this connection, unofficial reports from Russia, announcing change in the campaign against Constantinople as one of the require-ments exacted by Greece for her support of the Allies, was widely com-mented upon. The Greek Govern-ment, it was said, declared in a note to Russia to approach along the Gal-lipoli Peninsula was impossible, and that an overland attack through Bulgarian territory was the only means which the Greek General Staff would consider in the case of Greek par ticipation.
