> The public will anxionaly look forward to the report of the Board of Food Control enquiry into the recent advance in the prices of butterine, hard bread and biscuits. The advance on butterine alone means an additional cost to the people of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars a year. We learn by yesterday's Advocate that the Premier left for London via New York by yesterday's express. 'At New York he will arrange the three million dollar loan authorized by the Legislature at its last session." This will mean eight million dollars borrowed during 1916-17. Could not this loan be floated in Newfoundland? We have the money lying in the banks at three per cent. Why does not the Government make an effort to induce our people to invest in the War Loan and thus keep the interest (which at five per cent. means one hundred and fifty thousand dollars) in the country. If our people were given the same rate of interest and security as is given the foreigners they would willingly invest their
