Occupational Area Has Been Extended.

Allies Take Possession of More German Stations--General Election May Follow Law's Resignation--U. S. Patriotic Societies Protest Foreign Propaganda--One Power Standard of High Efficiency for British Navy--Sinn Fein M. P's Held Responsible.

HASTEN GENERAL ELECTION
 LONDON, March 17.
 The prediction is freely made by politicians to-night that Bonar Law's resignation from the Government will mean dissolution and general elections in the near future. The belief is based on the theory that Bonar Law is the only conservative able to hold the party together behind the leadership of Lloyd George. There has been much objection to some of Lloyd George's policies among the old guard conservatives and many think only Law personally and his diplomacy held them in line. The Conservatives have the largest number of party in the House of Commons and the Laborites will probably be leading the contestants. Austen Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, who has been mentioned as successor of Law is rated as lacking necessary qualities of leadership and magnetism to really lead the party. Lord Derby, Ambassador at Paris, is most talked of, unless Mr. Lloyd George should definitely align himself with the Conservatives, when he would be likely to make a strong bid. Some rearrangement of the cabinet is considered necessary, but will not be decided upon until after the Unionists meet next week and elect a new leader.

OCCUPATION AREA EXTENDED.
 DUSSELDORF, March 18.
 The occupation area has been extended from Dusseldorf to stations along the railroad running from Dusseldorf to Essen to within two and a half miles of Essen. The Central railway yard at Wedau, the largest in the Ruhr district, and Mulheim station are guarded by French troops. Dusseldorf is quiet.

BERLIN, March 18.
 Franco-Belgian troops have occupied the Western quarter of Mulheim station and the railway station at Dusseldorf. Other small Allied forces have occupied the West railway station at Oberhausen and the locks in the vicinity of Emmer canal.

FOREIGN PROPAGANDISTS
 NEW YORK, March 18.
 General John J. Pershing, speaking before a crowd which packed Madison Square Garden to-night at one of the most patriotic demonstrations here since the signing of the Armistice, bitterly denounced the persons of foreign birth who seek the freedom of the United States to spread "political warlike propaganda" to weaken the ties of friendship between the United States and her Allies in the war. The meeting was held under the auspices of the American Legion and other Patriotic Societies as a protest against a recent mass meeting arranged to voice objection to the presence of French troops in occupied

ourselves entirely to the maintenance of the one power standard, and that standard a highly efficient one, such as would maintain the old traditions of the British Navy. In order to effect further economies, said Sir James, arrangements have been made to restrict to the greatest possible extent, consistent with efficiency, the steaming of various squadrons, and, if political conditions did not make such calls upon the navy as to prevent this, it was intended to reduce the fuel allowances to a degree which would enable the Admiralty to show a saving of nine hundred thousand pounds sterling. Besides replacing four obsolescent vessels with new capital ships of the Hood class embodying all the lessons of the war, the Admiralty proposed to build a submarine mine layer combining all the latest developments. The views of the navy staff regarding the importance of capital ships as a unit of sea power remained unchanged.

A HOLD-UP IN DETROIT.
 DETROIT, March 18.
 Three armed bandits this afternoon held up two women employees of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way employees and railway shop labourers and escaped with six thousand dollars in cash. The hold-up occurred in front of the Brotherhood headquarters here. Miss Deal Newman, paymaster at the Brotherhood offices while en route from a downtown bank with the money, was struck in the face by one of the bandits who seized the satchel she carried and escaped with his companions in an automobile.

FOUND GUILTY.
 CHICAGO, March 18.
 Carl Wanderer to-day was found guilty by a jury of the murder of the "ragged stranger" shot to death in an alleged mock hold up and penalty fixed as death.

BLAMES M.P.'s.
 DUBLIN, March 18.
 An official statement issued from Dublin Castle this afternoon charges Cassels Bruge, Richard Mulcahy and Michael Collins with responsibility for organization and control of attacks on forces of the Crown in Dublin. The three are Sinn Fein members of British Parliament and thus far have succeeded in evading arrest.

HOW THEY MAINTAIN THE LAW IN U.S.A.

DENVER, Colo., March 18.
 State and Federal agents to-day raided the headquarters of the entertainment committee of the American Federation of Labor and confiscated twenty-one gallons of whiskey and arrested the two members of the committee named to provide the entertainment for the National Organization here next summer on a charge of violating the prohibition laws.

DENIED.
THE HAGUE, March 18.
 An official statement was issued to-day denying reports from Tokio that Holland favored the internationalization of the Yap Island cables and would oppose the Island becoming the property of a single power.

NOT YET.
 LONDON, March 18.
 Premier Lloyd George has not named any members of the Dail Eireann to attend a conference, having as its purpose the bringing about of peace in Ireland, notwithstanding reports

FRENCH MILITARY SERVICE.
 PARIS, March 18.
 The Commission of the Chamber of Deputies to-day eliminated the Government's reservation from the service clause of the Army Bill and approved eighteen months service with the colors, beginning with the class of 1923. The Commission called on the Government to report the results to parliament at the end of 1925 with a view to further reduction in the length of service. GIVES GERMANS SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT.

BERLIN, March 18.
 The recent entry of some armed British ships in German harbors, it was announced, in the Reichstag to-day, is seriously engaging the attention of the German Government in view of the gravity of the principle involved. Chancellor Freisendback urged a speedy passage of the Disarmament Bill, warning that delay for which neither he nor the Government could take responsibility would entail danger. The Reichstag Committee is discussing the measure.

REFUSED SYMPATHY.

LIMERICK, Ireland, March 18.
 The Corporation of Limerick, in response to letters of sympathy from the commander of military headquarters and the Divisional Commander of the Royal Irish Constabulary in Limerick has sent letters signed by every member of the Corporation declining to accept the extended sympathy and directly charging the killing of the Mayor and former Mayor to the Crown forces. The letters also accuse the police and military of negligence, saying they could have traced the perpetrators of the crimes.

COMMONS PASSES REPARATION BILL.

LONDON, March 18.
 The House of Commons to-night passed the third reading of the Reparations Bill, which provides for a levy of fifty per cent. on German goods. The provision will not be effective until March 31st. The bill was afterwards read a first time in the House of Lords.
