It is about time that favoritism were quashed. Any man who transgresses the law is open to penalty, be he big or little. the case under discussion both the spirit and letter of the Customs Act has been broken. And yet the Government hesitates to proceed. If there is one Statutory Law more than another that has long been held in respect, it is that governing the Customs, and to permit a gross and palpable violation of that Act to be glossed over, is a crime and the Acting Minister of Customs will brand himself as a criminal if he allows such a violation to go unpunished. To quote his own organ he has no gumption" if he does not carry out the law. The Minister of Justice may be pardoned for unthinkingly stating that he would have done the same in Pike's case, but at the same time his position as the highest legal authority in the land, suffers because of this expression made in the House of Assembly. Either Pike is guilty or he is not. The question should be decided by the Courts and no political fealty should be used as a shield to protect any person from the consequences of an act, which if permitted to pass, might involve the whole country into Bolshevism or worse.
