## Communist Leaders Found Guilty in Trial at The Old Bailey

Domer Having Failed, Herriot Undertakes to Form a Cabinet—Nova Scotian Coast Crowded With Smugglers and Rum Runners.

### COMMUNISTS FOUND GUILTY AT OLD BAILEY.

LONDON, Nov. 25. Verdict of guilty was returned to twelve Communist leaders in Old Bailey on charges of conspiring to publish seditious libels and of the incitement to riot.

### DOMER FAILS TO FORM A CABINET.

PARIS, Nov. 24. Senator Paul Domer informed the president this afternoon that he was unable to form a Cabinet. Later, Premier Herriot, President of the Chamber of Deputies and leader of the Radical Party, was summoned by the president.

### RAID CLUTTERED UP WITH SMUGGLERS AND RUM RUNNERS.

QUEBEC, Nov. 25. Rum runners on the Atlantic coast in parts of the Nova Scotian coast organized on a large scale and engaged in so numerous during 1925 season of navigation that they were actually in one another's way being unable to dispose of their wares, declared Captain Al. Levesque, of the Customs cruiser "Albatross," which arrived here from St. John's. He declared that practically all of the 225 schooners which had been engaged in the rum and smuggling trade of Nova Scotia were Canadian vessels, many of them were Canadian crews, who secured their cargoes at British West Indian ports.

### DIED IN DENTIST'S CHAIR.

HALIFAX, Nov. 25. Louise Margaret Mackenzie, aged 19, died in a local dentist's chair this morning while under the effect of chloroform. The chloroform was administered by a physician. Medical Examiner Woodbury conducted an examination and indicated his finding would absolve the professional men from all blame. It was an unfortunate accident, he said, that might occur once in ten thousand cases. The girl was said to have never been sick in her life.

### MOMENTOUS EVENT AWAITED IN JAPAN.

TOKIO, Nov. 25. The interest of all Japan centres on Asaka Palace where the birth of an imperial grandchild is momentarily expected. The announcement of the birth will signal nationwide rejoicing which will be redoubled in case the child is a boy, who will eventually ascend the throne to carry on the line "unbroken from ages eternal," as the 124th Emperor.

### TEN MILLION GOLD SHIPMENT TO CANADA.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25. Gold valued at \$10,000,000 was withdrawn from New York banks to-day for shipment to Canada. It is estimated that the shipments represent a fortnight of exchange transactions, as the Canadian dollar is quoted at a premium of 5.32 of one per cent. on the New York market.

Ontario court of appeal has ruled that London Street Railway must continue to sell 7 tickets for 25c. Recently the franchise was automatically renewed for 5 years. The company wanted to charge a 5 cent fare and is continuing to do so only anyone insisting on riding at what the court has ruled as a legal fare can do so. Meanwhile the Street Railway Company is appealing the decision to the Privy Council. The company claims that on the 7 tickets for 25c. tariff it cannot maintain the present service or maintain the present wage schedule. No dividends have been paid on the stock for some time now.

## Politeness Pays

An annuity of \$39 a year was recently left by a customer to a shop assistant "in recognition of the many courtesies received at her hands."

Cases of this kind are not uncommon. Years ago a journeyman shoemaker named George Robinson was walking out of Norwich, carrying in his hand a bunch of roses. He passed an invalid lady being pushed in a chair, and heard her say:

"What lovely roses!" He turned at once and gave the old lady the whole bunch. She thanked him, and asked him his name and address. He never saw her again, but twelve years later he received a letter from a lawyer, telling him that the lady was dead and had left him a legacy of £120.

Another charming little story of a similar kind comes from Paris. A London journalist received a legacy of £413 from a distant relation, an old French colonel, because, as the testator said, "he had always listened with attention and politeness to my old stories of my fighting days."

A Rich Revenge. The most celebrated incident of this kind resulted in a huge fortune being bequeathed to a young girl. When old Mr. Coutts, the millionaire banker, married the young and beautiful Miss Mellon, the Irish actress, his daughters by his first wife all treated the step-mother with disdain—all, that is, except Lady Burdett, the mother of the famous Baroness Burdett-Coutts.

After the death of Mr. Coutts, the actress married the Duke of St. Albans, and so became of much higher rank than the ladies who had scorned her. She completed her revenge by leaving two millions in cash and the partnership in Coutts' Bank, worth £80,000 a year, to Lady Burdett's daughter, afterwards Baroness Burdett-Coutts.

Servants have often benefited by bequests from their employers, but such bequests have usually been left in recognition of long and faithful service. An interesting exception is the case of William Whitins, who acted as valet to a certain wealthy Yorkshireman, and who was left the sum of £500 by his employer "because he never lost his temper even under circumstances of the most extreme provocation."

Kindness Well Repaid. It appears that his deceased master was at times given to over-indulgence in liquor when he became violent and would throw boots, or anything else that was handy, at his servants.

Years ago an American, George Housman, fell ill in a strange town, and was nursed through his illness by a certain Mrs. Landis. In those days Mr. Housman was poor, but, after he made a little fortune by clever speculation, when he died it was found that he had left every penny he possessed to his former nurse. The amount was nearly £1,000,000.

In the year 1902 a child fell into the Thames near Chelsea Bridge, and would have been drowned had not a boat arrived. When the soldier came to shore, the boy's father handed him £10, at the same time taking his name and address.

Ten years passed, then, in July, 1912, the soldier, who had long left the Army and was a musician in a theatrical orchestra, received a telegram to say that the father of the child whom he had rescued had left him £27,000.

There are many similar stories, but enough has been said to prove that gratitude is still a living virtue, and that politeness still pays.

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## The Cost of the Coal Strike

Commercial West: Two months ago approximately 150 thousand coal miners in the Pennsylvania anthracite districts went on a strike. Since the cost has been in excess of 175 million dollars. This enormous loss is represented by wages of the striking miners, amounting to \$1,200,000 a day; expenses of maintenance of closed mines, at six million dollars a month; loss to the railroad employees thrown out of work through the closing of the

mines; decrease in the earnings of the coal-carrying railroads, and there is a loss to merchants in the coal regions which is difficult to estimate. Then the increased cost of fuel to consumers of both hard and soft coals is another factor not taken into consideration in estimating the cost of the strike.

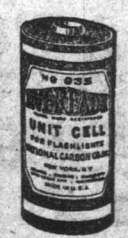
