The total cost of the College is about \$550 a year in salaries, rent, &c. For rent alone the Association pays \$150 a year. Our contemporary argues that students have a better opportunity of acquiring a knowledge of the Veteriuary Art in Toronto than they will have in Guelph. It never fell into a greater mistake. Why, it is well-known by our leading Agriculturists that the professional experience in that city is almost entirely confined to horses, and that students when they go out to practice in the courty full in their knowledge and treatment of the Galege to Guelph will do away with, for at the Farm and from the surrounding section there will be no lack of subjects in all the departments, and the students will profit in proportion (to the variety of the cases brought under their notice. It is very evident, therefore, that a course of study at the College in Guelph will be of greater advantage to the student than it could be in Toronto, and will better qualify him to go-out as a practitioner with a practical knowledge of the disease of all dinimals, and of the best methods of treatment.

We have in a previous article referred to the benefit which the attadents at the School of Agriculture will receive by attending the Veteriary Jectures.
