HELPING THE HELPLESS.

Annual Meeting of the Children's Aid Society.

Encouraging Reports and Election of Officers.

The first annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held yesterday afternoon in Somerset Hall, with Mr. S. R. Break, first vice-president, in the chair, and Messrs. A. Morphy, C. Hutchinson, John Hunt, Messrs. Andrew Thompson (postoffice), Fred Matthews, T. R. Parker (treasurer), P. H. Bartlett (secretary) and Wm. Saunders (inspector) being present.

The meeting opened with prayer, conducted by Mr. Matthews. The financial report was then presented by the treasurer, Mr. T. R. Parker. It showed a balance on hand of \$102.05. The receipts amounted to \$232.55, of which \$223 was made up of subscriptions and membership fees. The expenditures amounted to \$129.60. The report was adopted.

In presenting the annual report the secretary, Mr. P. H. Bartlett, dealt at length with the disadvantages under which the society was operating, because of the refusal of the police commissioners to vest their inspector with the proper authority to make arrests in the interest of the work. The belief that the act could be enforced by the police in the ordinary way. The executive intends to make a further application to the police commissioners shortly. They had no objection to the officer, Mr. Saunders, whose fitness and faithfulness had never been questioned. But until the approval of the board had been received it was not prudent for Mr. Saunders to make arrests. Notwithstanding this difficulty the work of the society had been very gratifying. Over 40 families, representing about 90 children, had been under the watchful eye of the inspector. Many children, who were before neglected and kept from school, were now being well treated and sent regularly to school. In bringing about this result their inspector had taken advantage of the act to give warning to parents and others, and in several cases unless a change is made for the better proceedings will be taken as soon as the inspector is vested with the proper authority.

Four children of Mrs. Gibson, Point Edward, had been taken in hand by the society and were now in the home. In closing, the report noted that the attention of the authorities had been called to the provision of the act necessitating separate trial for juvenile offenders. There were now 48 members of the society, which is in a very flourishing condition.

This report was also adopted, and Mr. Matthews' report of last summer's outing in the park will be incorporated in it.

Mr. Break referred to the success attending the society's work, and spoke strongly of the need of a public bathing place, where children, no matter how poor, could bathe in clean and unattended water. The society will act on the suggestion.

Mr. Break vacated the chair to make room for the new president, Mr. Parker, who made a short and very felicitous address.

A vote of thanks to Inspector Saunders, which every person present rose to second, closed the proceedings, but not before Mr. Saunders had replied to each and every compliment and modest manner. He referred particularly to the treatment accorded the society's officers in the city of Toronto and the consideration given to the working of the society. In London those in authority acted in a very different manner.

A letter of regret was read from Mrs. Clives Leonard.

The society is anxious to hear of any cases of neglect or cruelty to children, and would also be pleased to hear from families willing to adopt children.

The meeting closed with the benediction.

IN THE KINGDOM OF THE COW.

Dairymen's Association of Western Ontario. Notes by Secretary Wheaton.

—More Monkeying With Milk.

The interests of the association have progressed very favorably during the cheese season just ended. The work of milk inspection and instruction in cheesemaking at the factories has been pushed forward with much vigor. There have been more applications for instruction in cheesemaking than during former seasons. Still there is room for further increase along this line. A great many cheesemakers and factorymen postpone sending for assistance till the very last moment. Several instances have occurred during the past season where no application was made for assistance till the cheese were rejected by some cheese buyer. If the instructor had been sent for as soon as the maker saw things were not running smoothly, or even before he got off the track, many dollars, besides a good reputation would have been saved to the factory. We recall one instance in particular where a maker who knew that his cheese were not being made as they should be, did not send for help either through neglect or because he did not want to pay the instructor's small charge. The result was that his cheese were sold by the unsuspecting salesman at the highest market price, and when the buyer came to examine them they would not pass inspection and had to be resold at a sacrifice of 1 cent per pound. Many factories seem to adopt a "penney wise and pound foolish" policy in this matter and fail to recognize the actual value of having some competent dairy expert to visit their factories at least once during the season.

The cheese season so far has been a fairly successful one, notwithstanding the exceedingly dry weather of July and August. These prices have been higher than usual, with the exception of September and October makes, which are going off at somewhat lower prices than last year. At present, however, the market appears to be a little stiffer. The makes of September and October have been very large, and since the rains in September the quality is likely to be very fine.

There is still a large demand for information on dairy matters. The secretary of the association addressed a local dairy meeting at Shelburne on Nov. 8. Another one is arranged for at Carleton Place, Ontario, on Nov. 16. During the balance of the year a number of meetings are being arranged for in the newer dairy districts. Meanwhile arrangements are being completed for the Stratford convention on Jan. 15, 16 and 17. A number of practical men who are specialists in their own line have been engaged to give addresses, and as Stratford has good railway connections and good accommodation, a large attendance may be expected.

MORE MONKEYING WITH MILK.

On Oct. 25 Mr. T. B. Millar, inspector for the Western Dairymen's Association, inspected the milk at the Rothsay cheese factory. The result of his visit was that Joseph Freeland and Thomas Hayes, of Wallace township, were each fined \$15 and \$17.50 costs. They pleaded guilty before Judge Brishaw, of Harrison, the former to adding water and the latter to taking the cream of the milk sent to the factory.
