A PITCHER'S EXPERIENCE.

"The secret in fact, the first principle of pitching is to get the ball over the plate, to make the batsman hit at for. That was in 1876, 31 years ago, and though the Squire got her finish in front. The first horse was Francis Lovell's Mary L. Norah, second and the white representative of Chumside, with Charlie Wise as third. Mary L. was disqualified for a foul in the stretch, and Norah P. was placed first, Sunyside second. Norah P. was imported The Tester. Squire Peters had his turn again in 1878, when the plate was run in London for the third and last time. His winner was King George, by King Tom, ridden by Albie Gates.
