SHAMROCK'S NEW TOPMAST

Ready for Use in the Race
Today.

In Future Contests She Must Al-
low the Columbia 16 Seconds.

The London Kickers Who Will

AQUATIC.

THE SHAMROCK REPAIRED.
New York, Oct. 18.—The remeasuring of the Shamrock began this morning at Erie Basin, and 3,380 pounds of lead ballast were put on board the yacht during the night. This is said to have changed her waterline a few inches. The Shamrock had her new topmast fitted, but housed. Captain Wringle said the Shamrock would be ready for the race tomorrow. The yacht was reanchored inside Sandy Hook. The remeasuring resulted as follows: Waterline, 88 95-100; racing length, 102 555-1,000 feet. Under this measurement in the future races the Shamrock will be obliged to allow the Columbia 16 seconds.

ENGLISH OPINION.

The London afternoon papers illustrate the sportsmanlike view taken by all sections of the English press of the Columbia's victory yesterday. The St. James' Gazette says: "Our regret for the Shamrock's second defeat must be outweighed by our satisfaction at the fact that the accident was provided against beforehand, and that therefore no opportunity for a misunderstanding could exist on this occasion. The Shamrock's gear reached the crackling point first, and the fact that Columbia outsailed her with the same breeze shows that the American boat is the better, which it is just the object of these matches to settle one way or the other." The Pall Mall Gazette says: "This is a competition between constructors as well as sailors, and the American victory was perfectly fair and decisive."

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
What is the month and date for shooting deer? Can a merchant offer for sale venison? What is the time limit to sell? OLD SUBSCRIBER.

Ans.—The open season for deer is from Nov. 1 to Nov. 15, inclusive; but to shoot, elk, reindeer or caribou may be hunted before Nov. 1, 1900. Only two deer may be taken in one season by one person. This does not apply to deer which are private property. Persons who put or breed deer on their own land may hunt such deer between Oct. 1 and Nov. 15.

No person may buy, sell or keep for sale any game bird or animal, no matter where killed or procured except during open season, and for five days afterwards.

THE DAWSONITES

Only Numbers About 4,450 Souls—In August 1,738 Left the City.

Seattle, Washington, Oct. 18.—According to late advices from Dawson City, the census just completed by the mounted police shows the town to have but 4,450 population. Of this number 3,205 are from the United States, 805 from England and Canada. Of the population 3,659 are male and 788 are female, included in the total are 163 children under the age of 14.

During the period of one month, from Aug. 26 to Sept. 26, according to notes kept by the police, 1,738 people left Dawson for Cape Nome and outside, and within the same time 1,358 people arrived.
