Another Tenement House Horror in New York.

A Number of Persons Suffocated or Burned to Death.

EIGHT PERISHED!

New York, Oct. 17.-Eight people were either burned to death or suffocated early today in a fire which partially destroyed the three-story frame double tenement house at Nos. 45 and 47 Hester street, one woman being burned in full view of the spec tators, after having thrown her child into the arms of a policeman below. THE DEAD.

The dead: Mrs. Strauss, Samuel Strauss, 13 years old: Lena Strauss, 9 years old; Morris Strauss, 2 years old; Mrs. Rosa Lewis, mother of Mrs. Strauss, 52 years old; Mrs. Horrowitz, Mendel Strauss and Samuel Strauss.

THE ALARM. Janitor Nathan Gatz discovered the fire in the hallway and ran through the building shouting to the tenants. A private watchman stationed on the block heard him and sent in an alarm. When the firemen arrived the place was in flames and it burned like a straw stack.

Charles Strauss, a butcher, who lived on the second floor, heard the janitor yelling, and, picking up his 4-year-old child Josephine, ran out and down the rickety old fire escape. He made fran-tic efforts to get back for his wife and other children, but the flames were already shooting from the windows, and he was

CUT OFF. His wife ran to the window and threw out Isaac, the 5-year-old boy. A policeman caught the lad and he was unhurt. Then before the eyes of the horror-stricken onlookers Mrs. Strauss was cut off from escape by bursting flames, and her life whipped out of her, while the spectators groaned in their helplessness. Inside the remainder of her family suffered the same fate.

NARROWLY ESCAPED. Henry Bernhaltz, who lived in the rear, got his family out. Mary Martin and Mary Murray lived in the attle. They escaped, but Mary Martin was severely burned. Mrs. Lewis, in trying to get out, reached the second floor fire escape. There her body was found

by the firemen. The fire marshal has been notified by the police to investigate, as the fire is believed to have been incendiary.
