MISTOOK ACID FOR WHISKY!

Woman Drank Poison and Died in a Few Minutes.

Young Man Mangled to Death at Napanee by G. T. R. Train.

Detroit, July 12.—"My God, Archie! I drank carbolio acid by mistake! I thought it was liquor!" said Miss Elizabeth McDonnell, aged 28 years, rushed from her bedroom about ten o'clock Thursday night and announced to her brother, Richard F. Shipley, by mistake taking a dose of poison instead of whisky, which the family physician had prescribed. Dr. Lucien E. Ellis was hastily summoned, but it was then too late, for in a few moments Miss McDonnell was declared dead.

The unfortunate young woman had been troubled with her lungs, and Dr. Ellis prescribed whisky as a stimulant. The small bottle of liquor, through apparent carelessness on the part of some one, was left on the dresser in Miss McDonnell's bedroom alongside and almost touching the deadly acid.

Miss McDonnell was a milliner, and lived with her mother and her brother, who is an engineer on the Michigan Central, at 813 Dix Avenue. A sad feature of the death is that Mrs. McDonnell is at present visiting in Quebec, and it is feared that the shock to her will be severe.

FATAL FIRE.—Indictments against Thomas E. Keough and William V. Bowers, president and director of the Tarrant Company, whose building was burned after the explosion on Oct. 29 last, were presented yesterday by the grand jury. The indictments charged manslaughter in the second degree. Seven persons died as a result of the explosion. The men did not flee from the indictments, and the recorder fixed bail in \$2,500 in each case, which was furnished.

FATALLY MANGLED.—Napanee, Ont., July 12.—William Young, of West Plain, had both legs cut off near the body while attempting to board a Grand Trunk train going west, about 4:30 yesterday afternoon. The train was in motion when Young tried to jump on. He missed his step, and was dragged along, clinging to the platform for a short distance, when he fell, and rolled down the track. He died at 5:30 p.m. Deceased was about 28 years of age, and lived at West Plain, a small place about twelve miles north of here.

SUICIDE OF A CANADIAN SAILOR.—Buffalo, N. Y., July 13.—Fred McMillan, 30 years old, a sailor, whose home is in Burlington, Ont., committed suicide yesterday afternoon by jumping from the third story window of a boarding house in South Division street. McMillan struck the pavement head foremost and instantly killed himself. He was a Canadian sailor, and had been in Buffalo from Cleveland on Thursday and took a room at 44 South Division street. He was accompanied by another young man about his own age. His companion said that he and McMillan retired about 10 o'clock. He was awakened early in the morning by a loud scream. McMil-

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS

May Be Assessed Fifty Cents Each to Make Up Shortage in Endowment Fund.

Chicago, July 12.—If money shall not be forthcoming from the Knights of Pythias in the way recommended by the Supreme Lodge, it is likely a special assessment of 50 cents will be placed upon every member of the order for the benefit of the endowment fund. The only immediate action which will be taken by the board of control will be, it is said, the instituting of some forcible suits in an endeavor to rescue as much as possible of the money. Final action of the Supreme Lodge was practically unanimous for the higher rates, which place the whole burden on members of the endowment rank, only four delegates voting in the negative.

By a compromise agreement, however, it was ordered that when the old death losses were paid off and a surplus began to accumulate, the board of control should have authority to pass a regular monthly assessment as often as possible.

Theodore Lachache, of Sherman, Texas, was elected a member of the board of control of the endowment rank, to succeed Mr. Hinsey, who resigned under fire. It was decided that the main office of the rank should continue in Chicago for the present, and not be moved to Indianapolis as had been proposed.
