SARNIA'S SENSATION!

Miss Middleton's Breach of Promise Suit for \$15,000.

Sarnia, Oct. 16.—The court room was crowded yesterday with spectators at the commencement of taking of evidence in the suit of Miss Victoria Middleton, of Sarnia, against Dr. F. B. Wilkinson, of Sarnia, for \$15,000 damages for breach of promise of marriage.

Miss Middleton, the plaintiff, is a woman slightly under middle age. She stated that she had met Dr. Wilkinson, who had engaged himself to marry her, had advised two critical operations, and had abused his privileges as a family physician, and later repudiated his engagement to her. Finally, under pressure from her brother, George I. Middleton, of Winnipeg, he had acknowledged his engagement, and promised to marry plaintiff in six months.

In the meantime she had changed physicians, and gone to London for treatment, and practically saw nothing of defendant for six months, when according to her testimony, her brother called again called on defendant, and the latter had denied an engagement in any form.

Plaintiff told an extraordinary story of note that had been sent her by the late Mrs. Wilkinson ten days before the latter's death, and produced the note in court. It expressed the wish that on the demise of Mrs. Wilkinson, the plaintiff would become the wife of Dr. Wilkinson.

The defense alleges that the plaintiff's whole case is a conspiracy, and the evidence of an engagement or of any wrong-doing on the defendant's part, is a mere fabrication, and that the documentary evidence is forged, and can be proved so. The case is under way now.

Fire broke out Wednesday night at Ayer & Co.'s produce warehouse, on St. Paul street, Montreal. The damage to the stock is about \$10,000.

A substantial check reached the Toronto city treasurer from the street railway company Wednesday. It was for \$15,000, mileage at \$800 on the 80 miles of track for the past three months.

Mrs. Grace Snell Walker, of Chicago, who was recently divorced from James Walker, is to marry Frank Hoffman, whom she has married twice before, and from whom she was twice divorced.

Speyer & Co., and Kuhn, Loeb & Co., New York have purchased \$20,000,000 Pennsylvania Company 2½ per cent fifteen-year trust bonds, guaranteed by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company.

A gentleman in the confidence of the Young Men's Association says there will be no meeting of the Legislature before February 1, next year, and no elections before the crop of 1912 has been sold.

News has reached Quebec of the death of Marie Bégin, daughter of Adolphe Bégin, of Lévis, at Durban, South Africa. She left behind her a husband and four children.

The members of the Montreal Stock Exchange will vote in a few days on a resolution to raise the membership limit from forty to fifty, thus creating ten new seats. The ruling price of seats is now \$12,000.

John J. Thompson, of Troy, N. Y., age 76, died in St. Paul, Minn., last night from bronchitis. Mr. Thompson was a delegate to the Episcopal convention. His body will be taken to his home in a special car tonight.

At the annual fall meeting of the board of trustees of Princeton University yesterday, Grover Cleveland was elected a member of the board to fill vacancy made by the death of Rev. Dr. George T. Purvis, of New York.

Owing to the duty which the Australian Government is putting on flour, it is likely that no more extensive shipments of Australian flour will be exported to that country. The duty, it is thought, will amount to about \$1 per barrel.

The handsome residence of John J. Albright, West Perry street, Buffalo, was burned Wednesday morning. Mr. Albright saved most of his valuable paintings and other works of art, but much of his furniture. Loss \$50,000; insured.

A meeting of the creditors of the defunct Hamilton morning paper was held Wednesday night. The creditors' liabilities amount to about \$5,000 and assets to \$12,000. About \$12,000 bonds, being held by the Bank of Hamilton, are to be sold to satisfy the claims.

The New York police department has been asked to search for a trunk containing \$20,000 worth of jewelry stolen while in transit from Boston to Providence on Sept. 18. The jewelry included a complete line of gold workmanship.

The faculty of applied science at McGill University, Montreal, put an end to class "rushes," and imposed a fine of two dollars upon every student who took part in the recent "rush" in the school building.

A meeting of the West Wellington Conservative Association was held at Dryton on Wednesday, when officers were elected for the year. A committee was appointed to meet at Palmerston at the call of the president, to report on the question of bringing out a candidate for the next election.

The Bell Telephone Company (says a Montreal dispatch) has issued an order forbidding any of its employees to play cards or gamble on the premises of the company, or to be absent from work on the loss of time occasioned by injuries to players. It is stated that several large employers of labor will follow the lead of the Bell company.

Twenty-nine students are suspended from Missouri University, Columbus, Mo., for hazing. They will not be allowed to return to school until they have made a written apology to their victims. L. L. Thompson, of Slater, Mo., and likewise pledged themselves to good behavior during the rest of the school year.

Ontario grain dealers are complaining loudly at the dearth of freight cars at their disposal. They say between 300,000 and 350,000 bushels of Manitoba wheat are lying in the elevators at Port Huron, Goderich, Midland and other lake ports, awaiting distribution to millers. It would take about 400 cars to move the 300,000 bushels of wheat, but it seems as if all rolling stock available is occupied with export business.

COW ELOPES WITH MOOSE.
Bangor, Me., Oct. 17.—The strange story of the elopement of an ordinary cow with a wild bull moose comes from Lake Umbagog, in Piscataquis county. A big moose has been seen several times around the fence where the cow was kept. Thursday night a tremendous crash was heard, and next morning the fence was a wreck and the cow gone. Neither she nor the moose have been seen since.

LOCKED UP FOR HOURS IN CAR OF ICE.

Three Men Nearly Perished—Deadened Walls Make Cries for Help Useless.

Joliet, Ill., Oct. 17.—Locked in a refrigerator car, with the temperature at freezing point, and little or no chance of rescue, was the experience of three Joliet men the other night. They are: Isidore Hachstetter, salesman for Nelson, Morris & Co.; Reginald Hinchley, driver for Armour & Co.; and Frank Meyers, a butcher.

After being imprisoned several hours they succeeded in breaking open the door of the car and effected their release. The men went into the car to look at beef, and as Hinchley climbed in he jammed the doors and they closed with a spring. The men turned, but the doors were locked fast.

The three threw themselves against the door, but it resisted their combined efforts. They then tried shouting, but the deadened walls muffled their cries for help. There were several tons of ice in the car, and the temperature was freezing. The men soon became chilled and frantic with the fear that they would be frozen, they redoubled their efforts.

Finally Hinchley grasped the frozen carcasses of two sheep, stepped back, and with a running leap landed against the door. The doors flew open and the three inmates staggered out.

Wireless Telegraphy.

Up to the present time the greatest objection that could be raised against wireless telegraphy is the fact that no control can be had of the messages sent—that is, they went in all directions, and could be heard by anyone who had a suitable receiver. Besides this, if two senders were working at the same time, it was a guarantee that the messages of both would be so mixed up as to be unintelligible. During the recent contest off Sandy Hook, this was found to be the case when two systems of wireless telegraphy were used by rival news-gathering associations.

A story now comes from London which tells of a new invention in regard to wireless telegraphy intended to prevent this trouble. According to the description of the inventor, the transmitter and receiver are tuned to exactly the same pitch, and messages can be sent successfully. If the two are not in pitch, nothing is received. By this system it is expected that only those knowing the pitch of the receiver would be able to successfully transmit messages to it. This would make the plan to an extent like a telephone exchange, where the number, or pitch, of receiver would have to be known in order to get a connection. The British admiralty have inspected this invention, and have declared that it is a real remedy for the trouble of making wireless telegraphy practical.
