Pay Dividends on Loan Without curring Income Tax.

Toronto, June 8 .- The provincial treas urer, Hon. Col. Matheson, received a message this morning of the honorable recognition of Ontario loans by the Imperial Government in a manner that is certain to place them even higher in the list of valued securities for English investors. The privilege has been granted the Bank of Montreal, which acts as the agent of the Ontario Government, to pay out dividends on Ontario loan issues when they do not exceed 65 without incurring the income tax. This dividend represents an investment of about £120, which will include a large proportion of the holders Sidney Break, Douglas Weld, Jack of the provincial loans. These now amount to \$10,000,000, including the loan for the construction of the T. and N. O. Frank Delaney, Wilfrid Luney, Gordon Railway, and the later loan for the Niagara power transmission line. All holders of these bonds exceeding £120 will pay the usual income tax, which amounts to more than one shilling in the pound

This exception heretofore has applied only to dividends on Government loans. which are paid by the Bank of England.

Ottawa, June 8 .- Dr. J. G. Rutherford, Dominion veterinary-general, urges the establishment of municipal abattoirs. He does not believe it practicable to extend Dock- the federal act beyond its present scope. The Federal Government, he says, should Boys' race, 9 years.—Cyril Parker, guarantee the healthfulness of meat exported from one province to another or to foreign countries, but that the pro vincial and municipal authorities should protect the public health by properly inspecting all meat slaughtered for the local markets. That rigid inspection is needed will appear from the record of condemned carcases under the administration of the present federal law. During twelve months no less than 9,308 carcases were condemned as unfit for human food. The condemned animals were afflicted with various diseases, including abscess, tapeworms, dropsy, jaundice, lumpjaw, pneumonia, skin diseases, tumors and erysipelas. Some 4,397 were declared unfit for food because afflicted with tuberculosis; slink veal figures prominently in the records and accounts

for condemnation of 2,570 carcases. Dr. Rutherford points out that all these animals were condemned at Governmentinspected packing houses, where naturally the greatest care is exercised in purchasing only sound animals and where comparatively few unsound animals would be offered for slaughter.

He says: "When it is remembered that these establishments under inspection handle only animals of the best class procurable, the conditions which exist in the ordinary private slaughter house, conducted without inspection or official supervision of any kind, may readily be and imagined. Boards of health and municinal authorities have been too long neglectful of the necessity for intelligent action in the matter of meat inspection."

It should be remembered, however, that where packing houses slaughter both for local and export trade, all of their output is inspected under the federal law. Nevertheless, in a city like Toronto, large proportion of meat consumed by the people is subjected only to municipal inspection. In Toronto the Federal Government keeps from eighteen to twenty inspectors constantly at work in the six establishments subject to federal inspection. As a rule, no municipality employs anything like this number of inspectors
