

LAVERGNE FOR CABINET SAYS MONTREAL HERALD

Rumored That Henri Bourassa's
Lieutenant Will Soon Be
Taken In.

Montreal, Sept. 10.—The Herald publishes the following dispatch from its Quebec correspondent today:
The return of the Prime Minister to Canada has started the political gossip talking in the province, and rumors of important changes in the Borden cabinet, particularly affecting Quebec Province, are being peddled around.

The most important rumor has to do with Armand Lavergne, the picturesque and brilliant lieutenant of Henri Bourassa, and one of the leaders of the Nationalist party. It is known that he will quit provincial politics in a short time and enter the federal field. The fact that he was present at the reception to Mr. Borden on his arrival here from England, and extended to him personally a very cordial welcome, is taken as an indication that Mr. Lavergne will fight as a supporter of the present Government at Ottawa.

Mr. Lavergne will probably contest L'Islet County, and already it is understood, begun to make arrangements for soliciting the vote in that constituency.

L'Islet is at present represented by Dr. Paquet, and around this latter gentleman rumor has built up another change. It is said in Conservative quarters that Dr. Paquet will succeed the Hon. L. P. Pelletier, the postmaster-general, who will resign his portfolio on account of ill-health.

The Conservative Government at Ottawa, it is said, hopes to line up the Quebec vote behind Mr. Lavergne in much the same way as the French-Canadians supported Sir George Cartier, and, incidentally, the Macdonald regime, and that a cabinet position will be found for him in the near future.

SERIOUS SITUATION ON ARIZONA BORDER

American Citizens in Peril of Raids by
Mexican Rebels.

Washington, Sept. 10.—More disquieting reports of the situation on the Arizona border come today to reach the government. Mexican rebels were said to be gathering in the vicinity of Cananea preparing for a long and forced march. Forces and supplies were being concentrated there. No satisfactory explanation has yet been found as to their destination. Nine hundred well-armed rebels are stationed opposite Quitman, Texas. Gen. Salazar still remains at Guadalupe and is being closely watched by the American patrol to prevent raids.

The situation at Ojinaga, where there are several Americans, is causing the United States Government some uneasiness. Instead of a strong federal garrison as reported, it has been learned that the federal commander has only two hundred men. The rebels are gathering in increasing numbers in the vicinity.

REVOLT IN MONGOLIA

Russia May Be Asked to Act Between
Rebels and China.

London, Sept. 10.—A serious situation exists in Mongolia, according to a Peking dispatch to the Daily Mail. Kobdo, in Western Mongolia, has fallen, and Alai is considered to be in great danger at the hands of revolutionists. The cabinet, at a secret meeting, has discussed the advisability of asking Russia to mediate between China and the Mongolians, who are said to be prepared to fight China to a finish if an attempt is made to establish Chinese rule in Mongolia. Chinese reports, according to a dispatch from Peking to the Times, say that the governor of Hui, in the Province of Sinkiang, which borders on Mongolia, has been warned by the Russian consul that if Chinese troops were dispatched to Kobdo to suppress the Mongolian rising, Russian assistance would be given to the Mongolians.

MAYOR OF NEW YORK FACES TWO-HOUR QUIZ

But Fails to Tell Much in Regard to the Police Situation.

New York, Sept. 10.—For about two hours this afternoon William J. Gaynor, mayor of New York, sat in a witness chair at the city hall and parried with picturesque retort and evasion the attempts of counsel for an aldermanic committee to learn his views on the police situation brought to a head by the murder of the gambler, Herman Rosenthal.

Three times he threatened to leave the stand because he considered the questions irrelevant; twice he denounced the hearing as a scandal-mongering excursion, and often throughout his testimony he repeated that attempts to "scandalize" him would be in vain, for he said he had lived in the city too long and had begun his efforts to purify government long before Emory R. Buckner, counsel for the committee, was born.

At no time during his examination would he admit that the police department was inefficient. He expressed renewed confidence in Commissioner Waldo and declared that if the social evil flourished it was at least on the decrease and was a lesser evil than police blackmail, which he had tried to eradicate. By way of a counter investigation of the committee whose chairman, Alderman Henry H. Curran, he denounced yesterday, the mayor before taking the stand, set on foot an investigation of reports that the committee had accepted a high instead of a low bid for its stenographic work.

Nine out of every ten questions asked by Mr. Buckner remained unanswered. The mayor had formed no opinions he said, and had not come to tell his opinions anyway. If he were asked about facts or about any instances wherein the police department had violated the law he was ready to answer. In the absence of such questions he said he would leave the chair.

HAYES STANDS PAT

Sticks to Damaging Assertions Regarding New York Police Commissioner.

New York, Sept. 10.—Cornelius G. Hayes, deposed inspector, was again on the witness stand for cross-examination when his police trial on charges of making false statements, reflecting on Commissioner Waldo, was resumed at headquarters today. Terence Farley assistant corporation counsel, appearing for the police department, tried hard, but without avail, to shake the previous testimony of Hayes to the effect that Waldo had instructed him (Hayes) not to molest disorderly houses making "an outward show" of decency.

"Do you mean to make the unequivocal assertion that the commissioner told you not to get evidence against disorderly houses?" asked Mr. Farley.

"I do," said Hayes. "He may not have used those exact words but that was his meaning."

NATIONAL STRIKE MENACE

Some Danger of British Shipyards Being Tied Up.

London, Sept. 10.—A national joint conference between shipbuilders and the Boilermakers' Society will be held at Newcastle today. The interests of several thousand shipyard workers are involved, with the possibility in the background of a national strike. The national agreement between the shipbuilders and the Boilermakers' Society expired yesterday, and the boilermakers now want a new agreement, doing away with compulsory arbitration and allowing strikes at will. The reason given for demanding this change is that the largest part of their work is piecework, and the boilermakers say that in case of dispute the job is finished before arbitration can take place.

The agreement embraced thirteen other unions, which have not broken away, but which call for amendments in the agreement at the conference today.

The outcome is of special importance as all British shipyards are crowded with work.

WILL HOLD INQUEST

Death of Man Found Under Bridge To Be Investigated.
