PEACE PALACE IS MERE FAD FOR CARNEGIE

England Looks Upon Building as Chance to Spend Millions.

Thinks Laird of Skibo Is Neglecting the Real Peace Work.

[Special to The Advertiser.] London, Aug. 31.-The opening of the Palace of Peace and the proceedings of the peace congress have been regarded in England with almost complete indifference. Press and public here treat the whole affair as an amiable fad for disposing of part of Carnegie's millions, which has no practical bearing upon the realities of

nternational affairs. The movement is criticized as having gone forward on wrong lines, seeking to overcome difficulties by ignoring them, seeking imaginary Utopias, making itself ridiculous by futilities such as debate on the creation of an international fleet for the preservaion of peace under the command of ermanent council admirals, while aving undone the vastly more praccal work of educating public sentiment, which should occupy it first.

Gave \$1,500,000.

The palace is the gift of Andrew Carnegie, who, in 1903, placed at the disposal of the Dutch Government the sum of \$1,500,000 for the purpose, as expressed in his offer, "of erecting and maintaining at the Hague a court house and library for the permanent ourt of arbitration established by the eaty of the 29th of July, 1899." To provide a site for this, the first structure ever erected for such a purpose, the Dutch Government appropriated \$275,000. The site selected is in a section of wooded and hilly park stretching from the Hague to Scheveningen, and the cornerstone was laid July 30, 1907. An Impressive Building,

The palace, as completed, does not represent any precise style of archiecture, but it is regarded by architects as one of the most impressive of modern buildings to be seen in Europe. Rectangular in shape, it forms roughly a square of 85 yards by 86 yards, and incloses a beautiful formal garden. On three sides the ouilding constitutes the court house, and on the fourth or west side are the quarters of the library. The facade of the second floor is adorned with statues, the figures representing Science, Agriculture, Art, Navigation, Commerce, Industry, Conscience, Eloquence, Will-Force, Study, Authority, Humanity, Constancy and Wisdom.

Beautiful Windows.

The main windows of the great ourt are guarded by statues of justice and law, and over the central gable above the main entrance stands a figure of peace, her hands resting on the hilt of a sheathed sword, around which are swathed scrolls. Peace Decorations. Within all that modern art and skill could do to symbolize the purpose of the palace has been devoted to the decoration. The grand marble staircase which forms the main entrance is illuminated from a group of stained-glass windows, showing Peace bedding rays of light on Art and Science, Land and Sea, Commerce and Industry; while to the left and right are other stained-glass windows depicting the ancient horrors of war, and above them are companion panels of terror and death
