SOCIAL SURVEY OF CITY PROPOSED

Men's Federation to Undertake Investigation of Conditions by Expert.

COMMITTEES ARE NAMED

Rev. Dr. Shearer and Dr. Moore Make Strong Appeal for Social Uplift Throughout Dominion.

It is probable that a social survey, r scientific investigation into social onditions in London, will be underaken by the Men's Federation in the near future. At the final organization meeting held in the Auditorium Tuesday evening, at which Rev. Dr. Shearer and Rev. Dr. Moore, representing the committees on social service and evangelism of the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, were speakers, the offer was made to loan to the federation the services of an expert in this work for the purpose of making a survey of this city.

Housing Problem. The results of similar investigations in other Canadian cities were shown in a series of lantern slides, with which Dr. Shearer illustrated a splendid address. He dealt largely with the housing problem, which he declared was a moral problem, and the views showed more plainly even than the words of the speaker some of the conditions with speaker some of the conditions ditions with which they are trying to The first view showed several of the numeroums types of immigrants which are coming to our shores at the rate of 1,100 a day for the whole 365 days of the year.

He made a distinction between Britsh immigrants, and non-Anglo-Saxon mmigrants, the latter presenting far the more serious problems Help the Fallen.

He exhibited pictures taken in Hamilton, Fort William, Port Arthur and Vancouver, showing the results of investigations made there, and illustrating where good work could be done by such an organization as the done by such an organization as the Men's Federation. "I do not believe that it can be done without the co-operation of all the churches, not necessarily on the basis of church union, but co-operation is essential,'

The Premier and Finance Minister thought it better to leave the matter to the Bankers' Association than to legislate on it. The clause giving a bank a first lien

Mr. Emmerson moved an amendment, to limit the amount that banks could invest in buildings to 5 per cent. of their combined capital and reserve fund, and that monthly statements of their real estate in-vestments should be published. He said the banks should be legalized in the matter of purchasing real estate, but they should be limited well. The impression prevailed that banks were investing too much in their buildings and they erected buildings, not only for their own use, but to enter into competition with private owners in
