Consolation League Champs
Are After Dutchmen.

HAVE SENT CHALLENGE

Claim That Intermediate Champions
Promised Them a Battle After
"Dubs" Were Defeated.

Sarnia, March 16.—Sarnia's team, champions of the consolation series, has challenged Berlin, the O. H. A. intermediate champions, to a two-game series of a sudden-death battle to decide the supremacy of Western Ontario. They claim that Berlin promised them a game after the Dutch had accounted for the Sarnia "Dubs" in the O. H. A. semi-final, so it looks as if the disappearance of the ice is the only thing which will keep the two teams apart, for the Berlin management and team has a reputation for gamesmanship. The clash would be worth travelling miles to see. Sarnia thinks well of her team, while the Dutch are not the least bit modest when it comes to extolling the merits of their squad of home-brewed champions.

Lady admirers of the Sarnia team, Saturday, presented Dore, Farlow and McCarty who scored the goals, with boxes of candy. Louis Imbeau, the speedy Frenchman who captains Sarnia's exhibition team, has challenged big Jim Gramary, his comrade on the defence, to a duel. One of Gramary's fair admirers wrote him that she considered him worth a million Imbeaus, and she put it in figures, too—hence Imbeau's homicidal mania. As the challenged party Gramary has named ice as the weapons, the distance, 100 yards, and the date, July 1.

GREAT SEASON FOR HOCKEY IN SARNIA

Tunnel Town Never Enjoyed
Such a Winter's Pastime.

OUTLOOK BLUE AT FIRST

O. H. A.'s Cancellation of Five Certificates Proved a Help to Club
Rather Than a Hindrance.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Sarnia, March 16.—The Sarnia Hockey Club has just completed one of the best seasons the Canadian winter sport ever enjoyed in this town. Both from a financial and a playing point of view, the season ended has been a record one. Although no official figures have been given out it is stated in local hockey circles that the local club has cleared over \$3,000. The game has been well patronized by local fans and there is no doubt that the town is on the map to stay. Local people have been so firmly imbued with hockey this winter that the chief topic of conversation in these parts for the past several weeks has been the winter pastime and the great work of the Sarnia teams.

The outlook at the beginning of the season was a blue one. The O. H. A. put what looked like a decided crimp into local aspirations when it refused to grant Gramary, Imbeau, Farlow, Dore and Froot certificates. With these men unable to play, it hardly seemed worth while to continue in the O. H. A. intermediate series, but the local club decided to stick to the game and the hockey players in town, who deserved the name, were hustled out to practice in an effort to gather together a good team. The town was also trying the experiment of a junior O. H. A. team and material had to be sought for it.

The showing of the "Exhibits" in the exhibition games however helped to soothe the feelings of the local populace over the deal handed out by the O. H. A. and when the "Dubs" came through with a win on local ice from the touted London seven, enthusiasm fairly oozed out of local rosters in bunches. When the "Dubs" put London out of the running, the town became hockey mad and it continued in that pleasing state for the balance of the season. The fans are thirsting to see the consolation champions run against Berlin for the championship of Western Ontario. If these games are arranged and the exhibit team is put on, already plans for next season are being discussed and it would not be surprising to see a fine new arena erected before the end of the year. Perhaps that advertising at the beginning of the season which was looked upon so unfavorably at first, was not so bad after all.

REGINA TEAM RETAINS HOLD ON ALLEN CUP

Grandmere Fails To Lift It, Losing
by Score of 6 to 4 in Fast
Game.

Regina, Sask., March 16.—Worn down by the tiring powers of the Regina Victorias and outgamed in the second half, the Grand Mere team failed to lift the Allen Cup on the strength of winning the championship of Eastern Canada, went down to defeat in decisive manner by Regina, 6 to 4. The half time score was three to two in favor of Grand Mere. The score is a fair indication of the play throughout the match.

The game was played on the Auditorium Rink, where the ice was in poor condition, and the game was waterlogged. The crowd numbered about 1,500, all that the police would permit inside the rink. A crowd of many hundreds surrounded the rink throughout the match.

The game sent the Victorias into the second battle of the series of two with a lead of seven points and the Grand Mere team must win on Wednesday night by three goals to take the Allen Cup back again.

FEDERALS WILL NOT PAY CLUBS FOR PLAYERS

Chicago, March 16.—Lloyd Rickert, secretary of the Federal League, left today for St. Louis, where he will begin the work of drafting the league's playing schedule. It was said efforts would be made to avoid conflicts with the better drawing teams in cities which have both National and American League clubs, and if possible to avoid them entirely in the others.

President Gilmore, of the Federals, was asked today in a letter from a club-owner in an Eastern league that he reimburse the club for a player who had jumped to the new organization. The club paid \$750 for the player, but Mr. Gilmore declined to start a precedent by reimbursing it.

COOPER, OF GIANTS, JUMPS TO FEDERALS

MONARCHS WIN ROUND FROM O. H. A. CHAMPIONS

Toronto Rugby Team Loses Out in
Second Game by Score of
5 Goals to 1.

Winnipeg, March 16.—The Monarchs redeemed themselves tonight for their loss of the Allan Cup, when they put the Toronto R. and A. team to rout by the score of 5 to 1, and thereby won the round by one goal in the two games played on Winnipeg ice, the total being ten goals to nine. Playing on hard ice, the teams put up the fastest exhibition of hockey played in Winnipeg this winter, and with the Monarchs presenting their regular line-up, with the exception of Stuart in goal, who was replaced by Murray, of the Strathconas, the easterners were overpowered. The game was the first of the season, and the O. H. A. champions put up such a desperate defence that their work will be long remembered by the crowd. The visitors were minus Gordon Meekling, their regular centre.

Maxwell, the little rover of the Monarchs, was the star of the game. He outskated every man on the ice, and once went right through the whole team for the winning score. Gooch, at point, for the losers, was the pick of the visitors, but they could not penetrate the Winnipeg defence.
